Clarksdale Victory Hits Rock Off Loney Island; Three Survive

KETCHIKAN, Alaska, Nov. 25. . (U.P.) - The Army freighter Clarksdale Victory broke in half in 50-foot waves off the rocky coast of British Columbia today and the Coast Guard said it was feared that all but three of the 51 crewmen aboard had drowned. Lt. Cmdr. O. D. Weed, commanding officer of the Coast Guard Air detachment at Annette Island, flew over the disaster scene and reported by radio to Seattle that "it appears" that three men clinging to the forepeak were the only crewmen who didn't go "down with the ship." "I can't see how the rest of the crewmen could possibly have survived," he told the United Press in a radio-phone inter-
