#### Over Two Score Killed In Fighting: Palestine **Toll Mounts**

JERUSALEM, Dec. 5. - (AP) The toll from five days of riot and battle as the Arab world's 40,000,000 Moslems violently protested the partition of Palestine mounted close to 100 today with belated reports of a reign of terror in Arabia's Aden where 44 persons wee said to have been killed.

Meanwhile in Jerusalem's fivemile smoke-blackened "front" in the border area of Tel Aviv and Jaffa and Palestine's death roll, by Associated Press count, mounted to 48.

Elsewhere, in Egypt, Syria, Iraq and Lebanon Arabs faced Holy Mecca and prayed to Allah for help against partition. Most of them then turned to peaceful pursuits on the Moslem sabbath, but in Aden, the British colony on the Arabian coast, serious disorder prevailed.

The British Colonial office said the trouble started Tuesday after a partial Arab strike erupted into an invasion of the Jewish "crater" quarter which resulted in the deaths of 44 persons 25 Arabs and 19 Jews.


