MINISTERS INSTITUTE CLOSES AT SHAW

Raleigh — Attempting to offer to present church leaders in North Carolina courses of training that will enable them to improve themselves in the work that they are doing, Shaw University concluded last Friday a special four weeks' summer training program for ministers and mission workers under the auspices of the institution's department of religious promotion.

The program opened June 11, with the Ninth Annual Minister's Institute and the Eighth Annual Women's Missionary Training Conference, directed by Dean Benjamin Morgan and Mrs. Marcelle Ford of the University. Special features of the conference included platform speeches by Dr. Harry V. Richardson, chairman, Tuskegee Institute; Mrs. Ora Brown Stokes, field lecturer, National Women's Christian Temperance Union; Dr. S. C. Mayo, acting director, rural sociology department of N. C. State College; and Dr. L. G. Underwood, pastor of Bethesda Baptist church, New Richelle, N. Y.; the Rev. C. W. Anderson of Greensboro, and the Rev. J. R. R. McRay of Elizabeth City.

Especially planned for ministers and mission workers who are not able to meet college admission requirements study courses in Bible study and in rural church service began June 18 and ended Friday, July 8. Among principal features of the study program were daily lectures by the Rev.

FATE OF FEPC IMMINENT IN HOUSE

of them without funds for salaries, even.

Unfortunately, the burden of carrying an amendment is in the hands of the foes of the FEPC, and they have announced their intention to knife the amendment from the bill. The \$200,000, incidentally, is the amount recommended for one year's operation of the FEPC. The creation for a permanent committee is pending action by Congress dealing with this agency, whose authorization came by order of the late President Roosevelt and which expired on June 30.

The \$250,000 recommended is the same amount voted by the Senate last month and is less than half the \$599,000 in the FEPC's budget estimates for the fiscal year that started July 1. However, supporters of the agency said they were willing to accept the pared fund on the theory they later could obtain an additional allotment in a deficiency bill.
