WAKE FARMERS FORM Machinery Coop

Farmers of the Friendship and Holly Springs sections of Wake County have formed the first farm machinery cooperative in North Carolina among Negro growers to help solve the farm labor shortage. The cooperative now has a tractor, a combine, a mowing machine, and a wood saw. Other equipment will be added later as the cooperative movement develops, according to county Agent W. C. Davenport, director of the State College Extension Service. The 19 farmers who formed the cooperative have recently used the equipment of 361 acres and they are also doing work for other farmers who are not members of the cooperative, when conditions permit. "Other farm groups are being organized to pool their resources in purchasing farm machinery for the saving of labor and the general benefit of their communities," Davenport says. "In addition to this cooperative purchasing of machinery, the organization gives the farmers a better opportunity for exchanging labor and working together."

Couple Accused In Death Of Fremont Woman

Goldsboro — James H. Morris, 28, and his wife, Mrs. Dorothy Morris, 21, are in the Wayne County Jail in default of \$1,500 bond each, charged with the death of Mrs. Rosa Ward, 63, of Fremont, who was struck down by a Morris car on Wednesday, July 25, and died shortly afterward in a Goldsboro hospital. Deputy R. W. Percise of Goldsboro reported that Mrs. Morris was reported to drive and as she attempted to turn her husband in, he accepted the car into a yard in which Mrs. Ward was standing talking to a neighbor. She was carried about 14 paces. The Morrises, with the aid of another man, brought the injured woman to the hospital where she died a few minutes after admission. Morris then reported the accident to the Police Department. The couple admitted that both were driving at the time of the mishap, however, neither would take sole blame for it.

HELD UNDER BOND IN DEATH OF YOUNG MAN

New Bern — William C. Nelson, 20, of near Vanceboro is being held in jail in default of \$3,500 bond, pending an investigation by the grand jury in the death of Arthur Stauffer, 16, of a year-old youth who allegedly was killed when Nelson's "over engine" automobile crashed into the rear of the mule cart driven by Stauffer near Jasper last Friday night. Two other occupants of the cart were injured.

FOUR LIVES LOST BY DROWNING

Elizabeth City — All efforts by crews of the Fire Department and Coast Guard failed when they endeavored to resuscitate four persons who were drowned accidentally while fishing from a boat in Arnette Creek in Camden on Friday afternoon. The details of the tragedy are unknown. The victims, included Abner M. Marcer, 36, an honorably discharged serviceman who served with the Army for three years and 11 months. The others persons were: Ernest Bogue, 19, Walter, 15, and George Bogue, Jr.

DAVID SUTTON'S DEATH NOT DUE TO BLOW

An autopsy performed last Friday in Salisbury by Dr. Thomas L. Umphlett on the body of David Sutton indicated that the cause of death was not a blow received in an altercation a few days prior to his death. O. Z. Jenkins, City employe, was being held under \$500 bond awaiting the results of the autopsy. He was said to have struck Sutton on the head with a milk bottle. Heart disease was given as the cause of Sutton's death, who was found dead in bed about two weeks ago. There was no skull fracture.
