

FIRST NEGRO MONK HONORED AT FORDHAM UNIV.

NEW YORK (AP)—The Rev. Basil Matthews, the first Negro to be ordained a monk in the Benedictine order, was honored at a press conference held at Fordham university here last week. The occasion was announcement by the university that Father Matthews' doctoral thesis on West Indian culture...

...which he presented a degree last June, will be published later this year under the title "Caribbean Concerto." Father Matthews, 44, was ordained a priest 11 years ago in Trinidad, his native home. Speaking on his country, he said there is no color problem there as we know it in this country.

The "social invasion" of American troops in the Caribbean during the war, he feels, is perhaps the key to the future of these West Indian areas. He declares the mingling of West Indians and Americans raise the standard of living and could cause people to turn to the United States for studies instead of going to England.
