

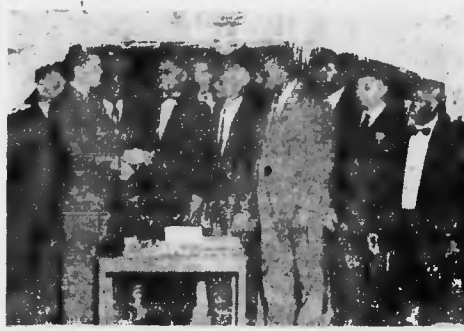
FSTC Choir Appears At Shaw

The choir of Fayetteville State Teachers College was presented in a concert of sacred choral music Sunday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock at Vesper services at Shaw University. On the basis of the splendid choral offerings, the 60 youthful collegians who comprise the choir, and their conductor, G. Van Hoy Collins, were warmly received by a large audience.

The program consisted of numbers sung by the full choir, by a Womens Ensemble, and the Womens Choir. A majority of the selections were sung in Capella. Mr. Collins accompanied the choir in the few numbers in which the instrument was used. Several interesting tonal and rhythmic effects, peculiar to the style of singing without accompaniment were achieved by the group. This was particularly true in the performance of Thompson's "Alleluia" and Tschakowsky's "Hymn to the Trinity."

The choisters were at their best, however, in the groups of spirituals. Their rendition of Hyde's arrangements of "Show Me the Way," and "Gonna Journey Away" were exceptionally well done. Special commendation must be given to the fine singing of the male section of the ensemble in the latter selection.

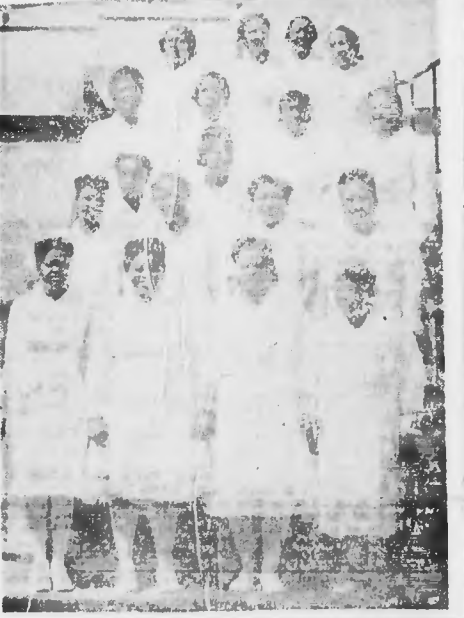

The council, which will take office on May 10, is composed of five members, three of whom are Negroes. This is the first time that a town in Tennessee has elected a Negro city council.

The first Negro to become a member of the council, will function as a representative of the Negro community. The council will be responsible for the administration of the town's affairs. The election of the council is a significant step towards racial equality in the South.
