## Negro Delegate To National Episcopal Convention

WILMINGTON. The 63rd annual convention of the Episcopal Church, Rev. Henry T. Wright, D. D., presiding, was held at Good Shepherd Episcopal Church, this city May 15. This was the initial convention presided over by Bishop Wright, as he was consecrated last October. The highlight of the convention was the course and forced address of the velle and progressive young bishop. He accepted every chance to impress upon the members of the convention that his programs and objectives were designed to meet the urgent needs of humanity and to meet these needs in a forward looking way.

Bishop Wright significantly pointed out in his address the fundamental challenges the Church in this diocese must face and solve in a wholesome manner. He particularly stressed the fact that the spiritual and material needs of the Negro must be substantially considered, especially the educational and religious phases of the masses of Negroes. The death of Negro well trained ministers and religious workers, he said, had brought about an awareness on his part, for the urgent need for plans to diminish the need for this era.

That hope, on the part of the Bishop, for more postulants to help carry on the cause for Christianity among the masses of Negroes, seemed not to be deferred. He said that he was working on plans by which Readers would be accentuated, which would result in a number of the missions with religious leaders. He said that the harvest was great. The awareness on the part of the bishop, as to the critical need for more consecrated and trained ministers, was evidenced by the fact that he said that he was desirous to erect in New Bern, a building to provide facilities for the training of Lay Readers. That this step was important, is revealed by the shortage of priests in every section of the country. It is strikingly apparent that during this fiscal year of the convention there will be constructive efforts made to cooperate with the bishop in meeting this challenging situation.

## Three New Negro Scout Troops At Sanford

RALEIGH. Three new Negro Boy Scout Troops were recently registered in the office of the Oconeechee Council from Sanford. Under the sponsorship of the Bladon Presbyterian Church, Rev. J. E. McMillan, pastor, John D. McMillan, scoutmaster, Wall Street Baptist Church, Rev. J. P. McClevey, pastor and the Fair Promises AME Zion Church, Rev. H. Johnson, pastor and W. T. Horton scoutmaster. These three new units have a combined enrollment of forty scouts. This gave the Oconeechee Council a total of sixty Boy Scout units for Negro Boys, with a total Scouting membership of 1,600.
