New Canning Sugar Stamp July 1st

RALEIGH — Housewives will get more canning sugar July 1 when the new stamp becomes valid for five pounds. Theodore S. Johnson, State OPA Director, said today. Johnson explained that this is the final stamp of the year for canning sugar, as no easing of the sugar situation is expected before 1947.

Although it is expected that 750,000 tons of sugar will be available this year for home canning sugar, compared with 500,000 tons during 1945, Johnson urged housewives not to use spare stamps unless the sugar is actually needed for home canning.

BILBO PROTESTS NEGRO VOTE

Seeks Cooperation of Opponents to Bottle Negro Vote

Senator Bilbo Conducts Re-election Campaign Without Aid of Negroes

Jackson, Miss. (ANP) — An appeal to his four opponents last week to help block the Negro vote was made by Sen. Theodore Bilbo from his headquarters here where he is conducting his campaign for reelection to the U. S. senate.

His letter to his political rivals pointed out that "thousands of Negroes, especially Negro soldiers who are exempt from paying poll taxes by an act of the Mississippi legislature, are registering or attempting to register."

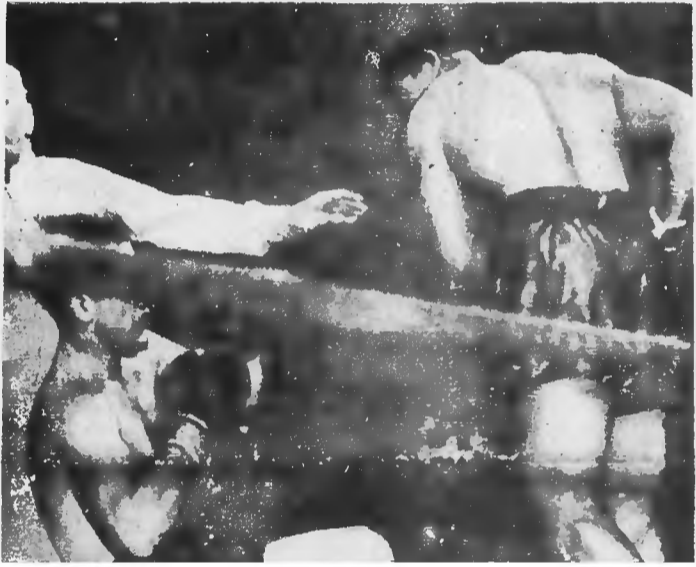
"This these Negroes have no right to do and they must not do," the letter continued.

Bilbo's opponents were warned that "any straddling or dodging or equivocation issue... must necessarily be construed as a desire on your part not only to secure the Negro vote... but an open avowal of Negro voting and Negro control of the political life of our state."

Negro Vet Must Return to Georgia Chain Gang

Veteran of Three Major Campaigns, Sentenced by Court to Return to Ga.

TRENTON, N. J. (ANP) — The New Jersey State Supreme Court ruled that 20-year-old Negro U. S. Army Veteran, Jay Gould Cotton, must return to a chain gang in Georgia.

In part the state supreme court decision said: "It is clear that the asylum state of a person fleeing the state of his conviction for a crime has no right to consider the merits of his trial, but only the obligation of extradition proceedings to the state from which he fled."

The court's decision backed New Jersey Supreme Justice Joseph P. Perskie's ruling in Atlantic City in May when he refused the request of extradition proceedings. Supreme Court Justice Perskie indicated that New Jersey has no right to question the legality of Cotton's trial in Georgia.

The Asbury Park, N. J., American Legion post engaged in attorney Robert Queen, for Cotton, Queen said that his client was 14 years old when he was sentenced and should have been tried in a juvenile court rather than a criminal court.

Dewey's Address at NYU Brings Great Honors of Booker T. Washington

NEW YORK (ANP) — Booker T. Washington and Harriet Beecher Stowe were honored last week by Gov. Thomas E. Dewey during exercises at New York University.

A message from the governor lauded Mrs. Stowe, author of "Uncle Tom's Cabin," as a personality that "occupies a unique place in the proud pages of the country's history." Her novel was "no accident" in arousing "the conscience of a nation," he said. "All her life showed herself a woman of high purpose. All her life she worked for freedom and human justice."

Dewey called Dr. Washington one of the great figures of our history and living proof that high purpose and constructive leadership is no respecter of persons or color. James Egbert Allen, said the governor's message. Cleveland G. Allen, who has led pilgrimages in honor of both persons for nearly 20 years, was chairman of the exercises. Other speakers were Mrs. Laura B. Prisk, Mrs. Marguerite L. Proleau, Mrs. Gertrude M. Washington, Mrs. Nellie Marshall and Henry W. Dubois.

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Negro Insurance Companies Reaches All-Time Record

41 Negro Insurances to Gather For 25th Annual Meeting, July 10 to 15

NEW YORK (ANP) — As members of the National Negro Insurance Association, comprising 41 Negro insurance companies scattered throughout the country, gather here July 10-12, they will hear a report which will show their combined assets as being a shade less than \$70,000,000. They have insurance in force amounting to \$723,225,311 covering 3,949,704 policies. They have enjoyed a steady growth which appears to be accelerating constantly as the member organizations move higher and higher into the insurance big business.

A preview of the report to be made by the Executive Secretary reported last week.

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JOHNSTON MAN SLAIN BY POLICE

Smithfield — Freddie L. Forder, 26, was instantly killed in Four Oaks about 11:00 Thursday night when he is alleged to have resisted arrest by Chief of Police Hudie Temple, Coroner J. D. Creech reported here last Friday.

Creech said Temple who was called to Four Oaks to make the arrest reported that Forder was "flashing a knife and making threats" and that previous to Temple's arrival had gone off, got a gun and fired into a crowd gathered on a porch.

When Temple attempted to arrest him, Temple said he whirled around, knocked him down and attempted to shoot him, and that he used his gun quickly and shot Forder.

The coroner said evidence tented to show that Forder had been drinking and that the officer shot the victim in "self-defense," but that he was holding the case open for further investigation.

The fatal shooting occurred in the yard of Mrs. Millie Coit where a crowd had gathered to attend a Sunday School party which was being held to raise money for the church, according to reports, and was the result of an argument about 15 cents due Forder for some ice cream.

Several requests for the action have been addressed to the governor, these quarters say which are in keeping with his state's customs.

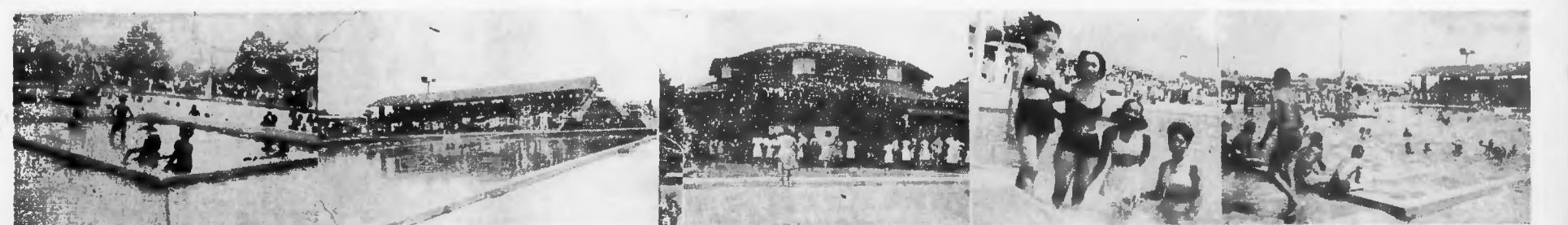
