SEEK JIM-CROW HOSPITAL FOR NEGRO VETS

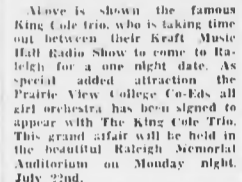

OVERTON FOUNDER DIES IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO (AP) — Impressive funeral services for Anthony Overton, one of the nation's most astute industrialists, were held here Saturday at Bethesda Baptist Church.

Overton suffered from a fall, Mr. Overton died Tuesday at the age of 81. Founder and director of the Overton Hygienic company and publisher of the Chicago Bee newspaper, Mr. Overton also organized the Douglas National Bank, the first and only Negro owned and operated national bank in Chicago, and founded the Victory Life Insurance Company.
