

**SOUTHLAND LEAD IN MURDERS**

MEMPHIS (AP)—That the South leads the nation in the ratio of murders committed in proportion to population, it was last week agreed that was evident when all major crime areas are credit as reported in the August issue of American magazine.

GI RAPE COUNT SENTENCED REDUCED

New York—The NAACP Legal Department has been informed that the sentence of Samuel Hill has been reduced from life imprisonment to ten years and restoration to duty has been recommended.

Samuel Hill was tried at General Court-Martial sitting at AGO 565 on the 7th and 8th day of March, 1945, for allegedly having committed the crime of rape upon a native woman. At the request of a native woman, the NAACP presented the Secretary of War for clemency in his behalf. The petition pointed out that the conviction and sentence were unwarranted and unlawful.

Hill has been transferred from a Federal penitentiary to a disciplinary barracks at Ft. Massoula, Mont., where he will be able to obtain reassignment within a few months if he makes an exemplary record.
