

Employers Urged To Aid Disable Veterans

RALEIGH — Mayor Graham H. Andrews of Raleigh urged employers to place all of their job orders with the United States Employment Service so that disabled veterans and other handicapped workers may be given an opportunity to prove their usefulness in a proclamation issued here this week.

The proclamation which was issued to set aside this week as National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week, October 6-12 cites excellent record of handicapped persons during the war while the able bodied were on the fighting front, and says that handicapped workers will accept employment for which they are not qualified.

In outlining the objectives of the week's program, L. J. Craven, manager of the local USES offices, said: "It is not what is done but what is left that counts when an employer considers a handicapped veteran for employment."

He said that approximately forty-seven handicapped workers had been referred to jobs in Raleigh during the past month and that others are waiting for referral to jobs, and that although many employers have been cooperative in hiring these workers some jobs are still needed to aid handicapped applicants.

The proclamation issued by Mayor Andrews reads as follows:

WHEREAS, Victory in World War II cost us more than 2,000,000 casualties and

WHEREAS, there are many millions of handicapped persons in the United States, many of whom by their efforts were of great aid in manufacturing munitions or providing essential service for the war effort, and

WHEREAS, all of these persons including disabled veterans of World War I and II deserve self-supporting, self-respecting jobs in which they can make useful contributions to our community, state and nation.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Graham H. Andrews, Mayor of the City of Raleigh, do set aside the week of October 6th to October 12th as EMPLOY THE PHYSICALLY HANDICAPPED WEEK, and I call upon all local officials, all local employ-

ers, all local civic organizations and all citizens to assist in every way possible, to the end that it shall be brought to the attention of all members of our community that disabled veterans and other handicapped civilians are fully capable and are performing efficiently, safely and reliably in thousands of different occupations.

AND I FURTHER URGE ALL EMPLOYERS to place all their job orders with the United States Employment Service so that disabled veterans and other handicapped workers may be given an opportunity to prove their value in productive and self-respecting jobs.


