### LITTLE BLUES TAKE HOME-COMING THRILLER, 9-0

RALEIGH — Washington High School's Little Blues had to extend themselves to the limit here last Friday when they defeated the strong and fighting Rocky Mts. of Rocky Mount, by the score of 9 to 0 before a crowd estimated at four thousand Bear Widders field goal from the Rocky Mount 22 yard line in the first period and his pass to Cliff Statham in the end zone in the last quarter for a touchdown. The Blues failed to convert.

It was Home Coming Day for the Blues and they had not planned to take Rocky Mount too lightly. After an exchange of punts and a fumble charging line had pushed Rocky Mount back to her own 37 yard line, Summerlin, Rocky Mount, booted to his own 37 yard line. Squirtle McGuire made a brilliant 15 yard return to the 22, a smash at end yielded a one yard pass by McGuire. Statham picked up a yard on a reverse. A pass fell incomplete, then came Wilder's perfect dropkick and Washington High could make no other venture during the first half. During the first half Jack McQuire, Little Blues fullback, got off some nice runs, crossing a 20 yard pass over his own right tackle. At the end of the first half Lawrence and Summerlin really teamed up to give the Blues forwards a headache. While Battle and Bullock kept the Blues backfield trying at the tackle and guard spots. What brilliant end plays!

At the start of the second half Rocky Mount took over but only for a little while. After Washington High kicked to the Rocky Mount 1 yard line, Summerlin picked up 2 yards at guard, a fifteen yard penalty against Raleigh for unnecessary roughness made it a first down at Rocky Mount's 34 yard line. Here the Raleigh defense tightened up and Rocky Mount was forced to kick.

Squirtle McGuire made a brilliant 23 yard return from his own 30 yard line to Rocky Mount's 47. A pass interception by Summerlin of Rocky Mount, stopped the local bid for another score at the Rocky Mount 20 yard line. Having been set back by a holding penalty, Long got off a beautiful punt which was good for a total of 20 yards. McGuire returned to the 25 yard line a yard from McQuire to Wilder and a penalty for unnecessary roughness, put the Washington High Blues on the road for a touchdown, which came in the beginning of the fourth quarter, Wilder passing to Statham from his own 19 yard line. The Washington High School has played like demons on the defensive with Joe Person, William Perry, Lawson, Taylor, Johnson, Chavis and Fallaway, coming in at times for brilliant displays of defensive work. Bro Adams was like a brick wall all day. The down field blocking was terrifically spotty, but the calibre of play had improved quite a bit. The stand outs in the Rocky Mount Club were Bullock and Battle, the pair of ends seen on this line were outstanding.

Lawrence, Hamilton, Summerlin, Coach Pete Williams was highly displeased with the showing of the locals and promises some big shake-up in the next few games.

### HOWARD BISON STOP SMITH 12-6

CHARLOTTE — Five first downs in seven minutes and Scooterback Dickens of the Smith Golden Bulls crashed over the Howard goal line from the six, to score the first Smith point of the present season and Howard's only one. Eddie Jackson, Brown, the aggressive Golden Bulls held the Bisons for the first quarter, with the edge going to Smith. It was not too long, however, as the Bisons uncovered three line hitters who would not be denied. One of them was a former Smith Bull, Sandy Greene, who followed Coach Jackson to Howard. It was Sandy who caused the Bisons to win when he crashed over for the second Howard touchdown, after Tony Wallace, ex-Armstrong High from Washington, had brought the Bisons a tie with a brilliant run of 34 yards around right end, to even the score. Henry Houze the alternate, Bison fullback, was the third man in the offensive triumvirate which spelled out the death snarl for Smith hopes.

Had the Golden Bulls continued to run big DuPre, their flashing line plunger, who cracked the Bison line almost at will, and the swift Dickens they might have taken the game. But the Smith offense was like that of a little boy who had these men and they were against the Jackson-trained Bisons, steady puny and without effect. It was a tough loss for the 4,500 fans who were in the stands for the homecoming affair of the Bulls, who had been packed by a police few brave, but unwise, sports writers to expose the favored Bisons. But the scribbles had reckoned without Wallace, Greene and Houze or the luckless offense of the Bulls. The Bulls just didn't have what it took, and that was the ball game. ### FAYETTEVILLE STOPS PRINCESS ANNE, 20-6

FAYETTEVILLE, N. C. — The Fayetteville State Broncos ran a string of consecutive victories to force by knocking a hard-fighting Princess Anne eleven to the state 20-6 at the Cumberland Memorial Stadium here Saturday night.

The Broncos, led by their stellar fullback, Wilbur Hunter, scored their first touchdown early in the first quarter. It was a brilliant piece of broken field by Harrison, State quarterback, however, that brought the score. After Hunter had tipped the Princess Anne forward wall for gains that carried from midfield to the visitor's 10, Harrison hit over the right and tackled, swung out to the right and threw a pass into his field to score standing up. It was a neat bit of side-stepping that shook him free of the Princess Anne safety man and into pay territory.

The second Bronco score was scored by Harrison on a quarterback sneak from the one yard line after fullback "Tank" Williams had failed in two thrusts to take it over. In the third quarter Williams tallied the last touchdown for State on a plunge through the middle from the 4 yard line.

The Princess Anne score came late in the fourth quarter on a long pass from Walker to Huggis. It represented the best offensive effort of the visitors during the game, their attack being stopped cold most of the evening by the hard charging Bronco forward wall.

Playing outstanding roles in the Fayetteville line were Monk Smith, Howard McAllister, and Swindell in the backfield, Hunter, Harrison, Spruill, and Williams turned in outstanding accounts. For the Trojans of Princess Anne, Martin, Dawson, and Phillips were best.

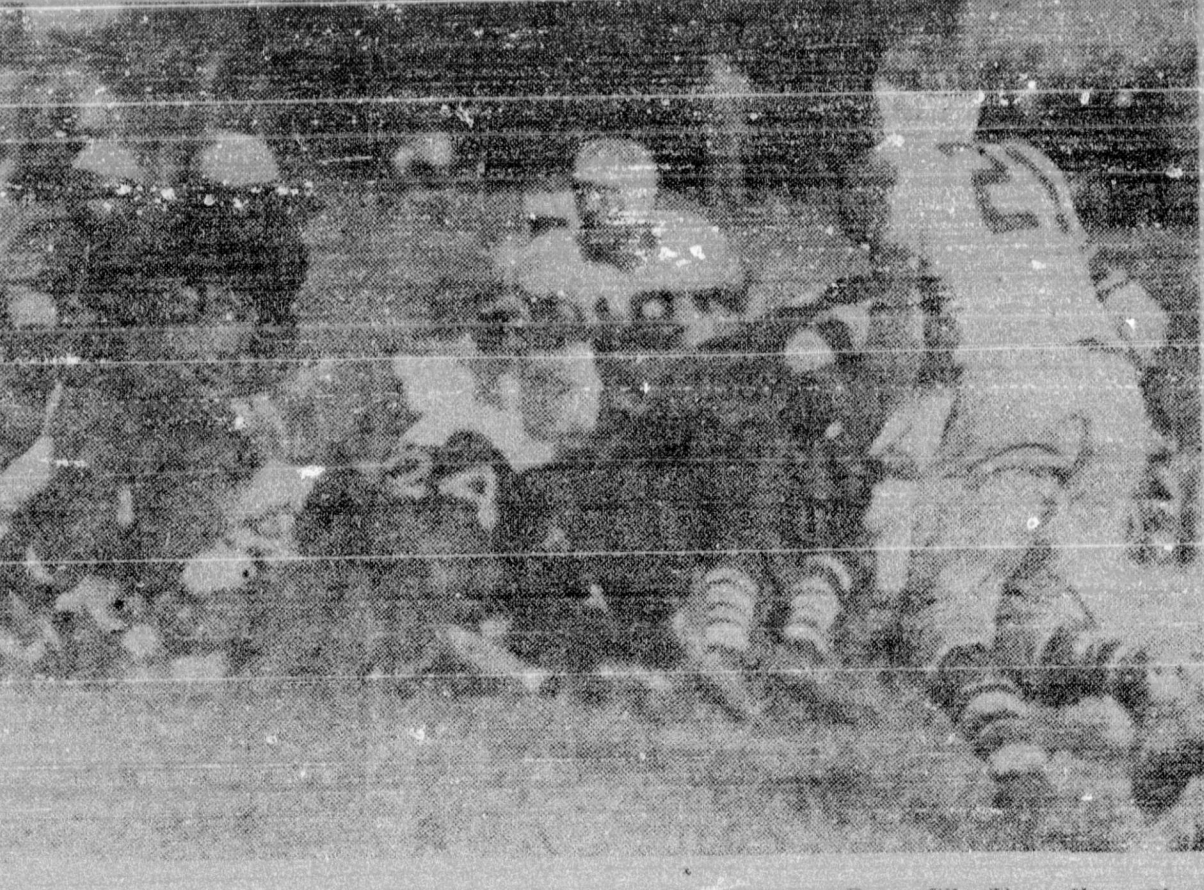
