## Australian Anti-Negro Propaganda Is Called "Vicious Slander"

### VA. MAN HEADS NEGRO BUSINESS LEAGUE FOR '47

CINCINNATI (NNPA) — Members of the executive committee of the National Negro Business League, meeting at the Mansel Hotel recently, named Lynwood W. Brown of Richmond, Virginia, as executive secretary of the league and decided to hold the 1947 session in Tampa, Florida, July 29, 30 and 31.

Brown, who will be charged with the task of organization work in the United States will also edit the Journal of Negro Business, an implement of the league's general action program. He is at present the editor of the official journal of the Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity. He is a national executive secretary of that fraternity and has a nationwide acquaintanceship which will serve him in good stead in his new field.

### 25 RACE GROUPS PLAN FIGHT FOR CIVIL RIGHTS

WASHINGTON, D. C. (NNPA) — A conference of national organizations, having legislative representatives in Washington was held here last Monday to map plans for the fight for civil rights in the Eightieth Congress.

Denial of a Senate seat to Senator Bilbo, changing of House Rules so as to abolish the Committee on Un-American Activities and changes in the Senate rules to prevent filibusters were discussed by the legislative representatives.

NEW BERN — Five persons met tragic deaths in Christmas-day accidents in New Bern. The dead are: Harold N. Gaskins, Route 1, New Bern; Mrs. Arlie Ward, Streets Ferry and her son, Tommie, age 2, were drowned when the truck driven by Robert Hadnot, New Bern white man; Alex Manley, Jr., accidentally shot when a gun went off in the room; and George Thomas Benton who was shot and killed in an alleged attempt to rob a store. Hadnot is being held under \$1,000 bond for a coroner's hearing in connection with the drowning accident in which both Hadnot and Tull Benton, white companion of Hadnot, were injured.
