CHARGED WITH UNINSPECTED MEAT IN HOME

BALTIMORE, Md. (ANPA) — Bishop Monroe H. Davis, who was indicted last November by a special session of the General Conference of the African Methodist Episcopal Church for conduct unbecoming a bishop, was ordered to stand trial Friday by Magistrate Walter J. DeWitt in Northwestern Police Court for the action of the 1946 jury.

He is charged with having in his possession 1,700 pounds of uninspected meat in violation of a city ordinance. An additional charge of having a quantity of decomposed meat in his possession also, was made against him.

OXFORD — Judge R. Hunt Parker Thursday sentenced Thomas Lewis to death in the gas chamber on April 11 for rape of Mrs. W. Mae Johnson, a white woman, here last July 3, and then read an open letter which he had addressed to Governor R. Gregg Cherry recommending executive clemency.

Admitting that he might set aside the verdict, Judge Parker wrote the governor: "The evidence in this case has given me great concern. I am of the opinion that I should not exercise this discretion and set aside the verdict. I am firmly convinced that Thomas Lewis should not suffer death in this case. I respectfully request that you as governor shall in your discretion commute this death sentence to life imprisonment."

Judge Parker and Solicitor W. H. Merdock would also write the governor recommending clemency. Lewis' criminal record was made a part of the letter.

KING AND QUEEN OF ENGLAND WON'T SEE REAL AFRICA ON VISIT
