WDL OFFERS AID IN SUIT

NEW YORK (WDL) — Hailing the effective 8-12-hour anti-firm work sit-in strike by delegates to the CIO national education conference at the Neil House coffee room in Columbus, Ohio, the Workers Defense League offered aid in any suit brought under the state civil rights law.

Initiation of such a suit was urged upon the CIO by the delegates in a resolution adopted after their sit-in. The WDL offer of aid was sent to George Weaver, head of the national CIO Committee to Abolish Discrimination. The day before the sit-in four Negro delegates waited an hour and fifty minutes in the coffee shop without receiving service. A portrait of Lincoln hangs in the hotel's front office.

Jones in a condition of involuntary servitude for 40 years.

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ETHIOPIA PAYS FIRST

WASHINGTON (CP) — Ethiopia became the first nation to pay her share in the International Bank Fund recently when the little West African republic sent \$37,000 in raw gold to the United States. The balance due is to be paid in American currency.
