NEW YORK (ANP) — The Reader's Digest magazine "has established a definite policy adverse to the best interest of Negroes," according to a study made of the magazine's anecdotes by Edmund Fuller, author of the recently published life of Frederick Douglass, "A Star Pointed North," and Frederick Winter, a free lance writer.

"In scope, this policy ranges from viciously intense anti-Negro propaganda to that of benevolent. But more revealing than the occasional articles is the stream of anecdotes, most widely read of any of the Digest features. Here the editors abandoned the patronizing manner of the benign uncle and boldly, brazenly, crudely emphasized its doctrine of white supremacy.

85 Registrars, Deans Gather At Hampton

"We adjure the present Congress," read the conference resolution, "to make liberal financial grants to the states for elementary, secondary, and higher education. We urge that such funds be distributed among the states on the basis of need, and that safeguards be provided that will insure equal expenditure of funds on the basis of population within the states."

"The life work of the President's Commission on Higher Education has been sufficient to reveal the grave necessity for a continuing program of federal aid to higher education. Therefore, we urge that this commission be continued and that adequate funds be

12 Schools Plan To Improve Education

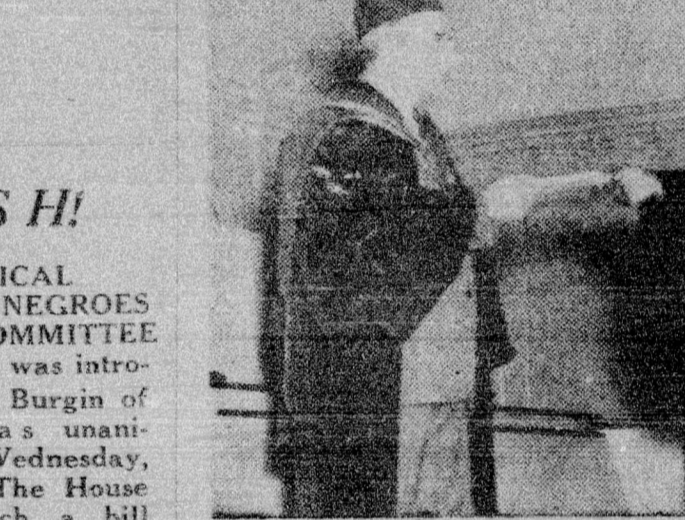

Claims Soldier Beaten When He Wrote NAACP

NEW YORK — One of the most shocking cases of army brutality was revealed when the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People disclosed the findings of an investigator who had been sent to Camp Kilmer in New Jersey to track down reports of a series of beatings and other forms of inhuman treatment to which a Negro soldier was exposed for allegedly having written a letter to the NAACP requesting aid. The British and battered soldier, Private Townsend Horton, of Chattanooga, Tennessee, from all indications was still confined to the camp's stockade.

Horton, when seen by the investigator, was still visibly suffering from his alleged ordeal, details of which were indignantly substantiated by other prisoners in the camp stockade, one of them a white prisoner who on one occasion
