SHAW CHOIR TO GIVE ANNUAL SPRING CONCERT

RALEIGH — The Shaw University Choral Society and the Women's Choir will be presented in an annual spring concert Sunday afternoon at 6 in Greenleaf Chapel. The concert, a popular event with students and friends of the institution, marks the opening of the 22nd commencement season at Shaw University.

The Shaw choir groups have recently returned to the city after an extended tour of cities in Virginia and New Jersey where they were enthusiastically received by appreciative and critical audiences. In addition the chorus, strengthened this year by large additions to the male section, has been highly praised on numerous appearances in Raleigh and throughout the state.

Among selections to be included on the program are compositions of Hayden, Beethoven, Handel, Zingarelli, Saint-Saens, di Lasso, Robertson, Albeniz, and Mueller. HARLEM TO HAVE CINEMA RESTAURANT

NEW YORK — In all the world, Harlem again is first — with something new in entertainment. This time it is a "Cinema-Cafe."

According to an announcement from Herald Pictures, they will release their first all-Negro feature motion picture, "Boy! What a Girl!" Wednesday, May 21st at the reconverted Club Bar on 132nd and Lenox Avenue, which will become America's first Cinema Cafe.

Workmen are installing a projection booth for first run all-Negro pictures that are to be featured at the establishment. There will be an elaborate stage show in the evenings in addition to the screen fare. In the afternoon, there will be coffee, sandwiches and cocktails. The single price will cover both the entertainment and the food or drink.

Opening at 12 noon, Cinema Cafe will serve a special Luncheon from opening times until 3 P. M. The patron will be served a soft drink and his choice of sandwiches of different types. From three until 6 P. M. will be served from 6 p. m. to 10 p. m.

MIAMI (ANP) — Twenty-seven years ago, Chauncey Lee's Whispering orchestra attempted to play white Miami and its musicians were physically beaten and ran out of town.

Last week, Sammy Wilson and his Rockland Palace orchestra, featuring such stars as Emory Evans, Peter Gardner, Bobbie Lopez, Mary Griffin and Dave Young, played the Frolic Club, most popular of Miami's Bay Shore Place entertainment night spots, and got a rousing welcome from a capacity-crowded house.

Several Negro bands have played white Miami night spots recently, but never has an attempt been made to stage a show. Emory Evans, popular once at Bill Rivers Rockland Palace who with the above artists lately toured Nassau, closed the evening's entertainment singing the number, "Why Can't This Happen More Often."

COURT INSURES ROBESON RIGHT TO SING IN N. Y.

ALBANY, N. Y. — Justice Isaac Bookstein Monday ruled that Paul Robeson must be allowed to give a scheduled recital Friday night in the Albany School Auditorium, but that he must "stick to singing."

He granted the injunction to prevent the Albany Board of Education from interfering with the recital after the Carver Cultural Society, a Negro church organization, had obtained a permit to use the auditorium.

Emphasizing the fact that the permit of the Board of Education is for a musical concert and nothing more, the decision reads: "The Board has no right to rescind the agreement. The political philosophy of the mayor has nothing to do with purposes for which the permit was originally granted. The injunction is to retain the defendant, the School Board, only from interfering with a musical concert."
