REACTION VARY ON FEDERATION

Kinston, Jamaica (ANP) — Responsible West Indian leaders one week wobbled and halted in arriving at a decision whether they are to accept or reject the West Indies federation.

Conference to discuss the question of federation which literally is a political cross roads leading either to progress or failure in the future destiny of the British Caribbean islands, has been fixed for Sept. 11.

Up to the present time, neither Jamaica nor Trinidad has expressed enthusiasm about federation. As a matter of fact, Trinidad is scantly opposed and in fact is a last minute protest on grounds that she is the most independent among British Caribbean possessions.

FRISCO OFFICIALS BACK Anti-Lynch Law

San Francisco (ANP) — The city board of supervisors is opposed to favoring federal anti-lynch legislation.

A resolution, unanimously adopted without discussion, urged federal authorities to prohibit lynchings and to intervene whenever a state fails to protect the lives of its citizens against lynchings.

The resolution was introduced by the San Francisco Committee for Passage of Anti-Lynch legislation. Sponsors of the committee include the NAACP, National Negro congress, San Francisco CO council, National Union of Marine Cooks and Stewards, Council for Civic Unity, Ministerial Alliance, Urban League and the Lawyers guild.

More than 50,000 persons are engaged in public playground recreation work.

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ART EXHIBITS DISPLAYED BY HAMPTON INST.

Hampton Institute, Va.—Nearly 300 articles, 550 of them made by students in Hampton Institute summer classes for teachers of industrial arts, were exhibited here Monday, July 28, in an annual all-day summer exhibit and demonstration of Fine and Industrial Arts. Luther Hamant, a third student from Washington, D. C., played a leading role in the exhibit, says his instructor, Jerome K. Levitt, who also is supervisor of Elementary Schools at Los Alamos, New Mexico. Another student who contributed a large share of articles was Mrs. Hattie E. Coleman, in weaving.

Among the exhibits included were those in clay, cement, charcoal rendering, block printing, weaving, plastics, painting, and other media.

The Industrial Arts Exhibit was one of the several activities rounding out the last day of the six-week term of the Summer Session. A "State Department Day" panel presented Dr. L. F. Palmer of the Hampton staff, and three visiting experts from state departments of education who discussed requirements for certification and state salaries.

The visitors were Dr. J. L. Buck, Virginia; James E. Hillman, N. C.; and Paul Ruffington, Md.

A fashion show presenting clothes constructed and in some cases modeled by students in the Hampton Institute clothing clinic, concluded the day's activities.

Under the direction of the instructors, Mrs. Ruth F. Adams of Stephens College, and Miss Frankie West of Atlanta, Ga., the program displayed casual clothes, afternoon dresses, and evening dresses in up-to-date variety.

RANDOLPH HITS SE. ELLENDER ON PERMANENT FEPC

Washington (ANP) — A. Philip Randolph, co-chairman of the National Council for a Permanent FEPC, Saturday made the following statement on the senate labor and public welfare committee's announcement that the lives Chavez bill against discrimination in employment would be held in committee until congress returns from recess, when amendments by members of the full committee would be considered.

The Ellender filibuster against long-overdue justice in employment opportunity for 20 million Americans has won another delaying action.

"A plan for rendering this bill meaningless and passing it in that form next year is now in the making and will be exposed shortly by the National Council, the Permanent FEPC.

"As co-chairman of the National Council, I will make a full report on the steps by which the defenders of discrimination in employment, aided by appeasement, have prevented this bill from being reported out of committee. This report will be presented next week to the members of the council's board of directors, affiliated and co-operating organizations and the public.

"The fight for justice in employment will continue. We can win not a meaningless and resulting legislative gesture, but an effective law. The fate of this bill is in the hands of the minorities and of all Americans of good will. Success depends upon information and organization. Both must be stepped up immediately."

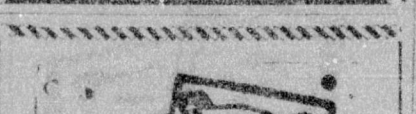
PURSE SNATCHER IN \$65 ST. ROBBERY
