NEW YORK (AP) - Two new housing projects, accommodating 6,000 persons and costing a total of \$20,947,000, were being planned for Harlem last week following Mayor O'Dwyer and the Board of Estimate's vote.

Work on the Highbridge Park project, located next door to the famed Polo Grounds and the Harlem River, is expected to get underway immediately. The other location, bounded by 127th, 129th Streets and Seventh and Eleventh Avenues, cannot be started until several buildings on that spot are razed.
