South Park Residents Irked

"Potential Balance Of Power" Held In 17 States

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Racial Barriers Breaking Girl Scouts Told

COUNCIL ORDER DRAWS WRATH OF LOCAL AREA

RALEIGH — The new city ordinance requiring residents of Raleigh to place their garbage in sanitation cans with top covers the wrath of South Park residents who have been struggling for several years to get the city to install lights in the area and put in night lights so that city mail and bus service may be extended to the area where copies of the ordinance were distributed here last week.

The struggle of the residents of the area under the handicap they must live under became apparent for the first time in March, 1946 when Lacy L. McNeill of 1305 Holman Street collected signatures on a petition to the Carolina Power and Light Company of Raleigh to install lights.

An outline of a petition to City Manager Roy S. Braden last September pointed out that there are four streets running east and west which have no crossing over or under the Southern Railroad and that there are four other streets running

MRS. FERGUSON SAYS PROGRESS IS BEING MADE

LONG BEACH, Calif. — Notable progress is being made in breaking down racial barriers in the Girl Scout movement, and in extending unity to all girls, regardless of race, creed, or color, Mrs. C. Virginia Ferguson of Schenectady, N. Y., National President of the Girl Scouts, told the 29th Biennial Convention of the National Council of Girl Scouts at its first session here last week.

In Richmond, Virginia, Mrs. Ferguson said, all senior Girl Scouts, regardless of race, worked together on a joint project of the Leadership Building, Region 1 of the Southwestern inter-cultural camp has been held so that Indian girls and white girls might learn something of each other, have life and backlogs.

In St. Louis, she pointed out, after long years of quiet education it was possible for senior Girl Scouts to elect an outstanding member to the President of the State Planning Board.

Racial harmony is the keynote of the Convention, where 2,600 Girl Scout adult members and Senior Girl Scouts are assembled from all parts of the country, Alaska and Hawaii. The delegates include Negro representatives and outstanding Negro leaders are taking part in the various discussion sessions. Since March, 1946, the total membership of the group has grown 25 per cent, reaching an all-time high of approximately 1,300,000 girls and adults. Many more girls wish to join the Girl Scouts, Mrs. Ferguson said, but are prevented from doing so.

U. S. SUPREME COURT REVIEWS OKLA. CASE

WASHINGTON — (NNPA) — The United States Supreme Court last Monday decided to review the decision of the Oklahoma Supreme Court affirming the decision of the District Court of Cleveland County, Oklahoma, refusing to issue a writ of mandamus to compel the University of Oklahoma to admit to its law school Miss Ada Lois Sipuel, a Langston University graduate.

Miss Sipuel applied January 16, 1946, for admission to the first year class of the University of Oklahoma School of Law.

The State of Oklahoma makes no provision for legal training of colored persons with the State, but operates an out-of-state scholarship plan for those wishing legal and other professional training.

Affirming the judgment of the lower court, the Oklahoma Supreme Court ruled that her admission was contrary to the constitution, laws and public policy of the State, that scholarship aid was available, and that no demand had been made on the Board of Regents of Higher Education to provide legal training at Langston University.

NO RESERVE DEADLINE
