U. S. SUPREME **COURT REVIEWS** OKLA, CASE

The United States Supreme Court last Monday decided to review the decision of the Oklahoma Supreme Court affirming the decision of the District Court of Cleveland County, Oklahoma, fusing to issue a writ of manda nus to compel the University of Oklahoma to admit to its law school Miss Ada Lois Sipuel, a Langston University graduate. Miss Sipuel applied January 18. 1946, for admission to the first year

class of the University of Oklahoma School of Law. The State of Oklahoma makes no provision for legal training of colored persons with the State but operates an out-of state scholarship plan for those wishing legal and other professional

Affirming the judgment of the lower court, the Oklahoma Supreme Court ruled that her admission was contrary to the constitution, laws and public polic of the State, that scholarship aid was available, and that no demand had been made on the Board of Regents of Higher Education to provide legal training at Langston University.

"The Democratic party localto failed to take advantage of the colored vote in the days of the New Deal, and did nothing for them above and beyond what the GOP has done," one

observer said, Despite the unusual campaign raged by the Democratic candid ite, the GOP candidate, Mayor Eernard Samuel, won by the largest majoritp given a mayralty candidate since 1931.

Henderson Goes To hv. House Of Rep.

LOUISVILLE (NNPA) -Dennis Henderson, Republican, local colored attorney, was elected to the Kentucky House of Representatives from the forty-second legislative district in the recent election to succeed Charles W. Anderson, Jr. He beat his Democratic opponent, William Childress, also colored, by 90 votes. Childress

has been granted a recount. Loui-ville replaced its Republican Board of Aldermen with an entirely Democratic one. The lone colored member, Eugene Clayton, Republican,

was swept off the board.

Writing as the Secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, Whites points out that the Negroes now hold the "potential balance of power in 17 states of the north and west and that their greatest power, outside the south, in nine of the biggest stataes. These nine states have a total electoral votes 223, and the earty which carries them will put its candidate in the White House in 1948, White says. "Only 260 votes are needed to elect a President." The other eight states with a substantial concentration Negro voters, have an addi-Lonal 72 electoral votes. DEWEY WOULD BE

PRESIDENT "If the Negroes had voted as a bloc against Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1944. Dewey would now be President," White reports. He points out that the total colored vote, in eleven of the 17 states, is greataer than the plurality given Roosevelt and that a switch of these electoral votes would have resulted in a Republican
