

Dr. Dorsey, N. C. College, To Conduct Music Clinics

DURHAM — Dr. James E. Dorsey, head of the department of music at North Carolina College, will conduct a Music Clinic for High School teachers of Cleveland County, Friday and Saturday, November 21 and 22 in Shelby, N. C. This clinic is being held under the sponsorship of Mrs. Ezra A. Bridges, chairman of the Cleveland County Teachers Association. Dr. Dorsey's speeches to the group will stress the underlying plans of education through music. He has stated that it is his plan to present new and interesting materials and to show through demonstrations with local school choruses, various techniques of teaching and directing choral works.

There will be a discussion and consultation period which is designed to give the teacher an opportunity to present individual problems which have come to them during their experience as high school music teachers.

A graduate of Lincoln University in Pennsylvania, and the University of Pennsylvania, Dr. Dorsey holds masters and doctoral degrees from the University of Pennsylvania, and another doctorate from Columbia University.

He is attempting to begin in North Carolina the same type of clinic which he conducts annually during the summer months as head of the summer school music at Hampton Institute.

Rabbi Miller Raps FCC

NEW YORK (ANP) — Rabbi Irving Miller, chairman of the executive committee of the American Jewish congress, criticized the FCC this week for failing to establish a rule whereby racial or religious bias would disqualify future applicants for broadcasting licenses.

Expressing gratitude for the action of the FCC in denying the New York Daily News an FM license, Rabbi Miller said: "It is to be regretted that the FCC did not take advantage of this occasion to face the fundamental issue squarely."

Announcing that the American Jewish congress is pledged to a continued campaign to gain such an over-all ruling, Rabbi Miller stated that "as it has already done successfully in the case of the Daily News," it will continue to oppose the grant of any license to biased publications.

RALEIGH — Founder's Day Exercises will be held at Shaw University Friday, November 21, when the 82nd anniversary of the institution will be observed. The late Dr. Henry Martin Tupper, who as an honorably discharged Union Army Veteran, founded the school in 1865, will be memorialized and a wreath will be placed on his grave in keeping with a custom of more than half a century.

The Founder's Day address will be delivered by the Rev. C. E. Griffin, pastor of First Calvary Baptist Church, Norfolk, Va., and president of the General Alumni Association of Shaw University. Mr. Griffin is a graduate of Shaw in 1933 with the A. B. and B. Th. degree is a former Executive Secretary of the General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Memorial services at the Founders' grave will begin Friday morning at 10:30 and will be followed at 11 o'clock with the Founder's Day program in Greenleaf Chapel. A meeting of the Executive Committee of the Association is scheduled for Friday afternoon.

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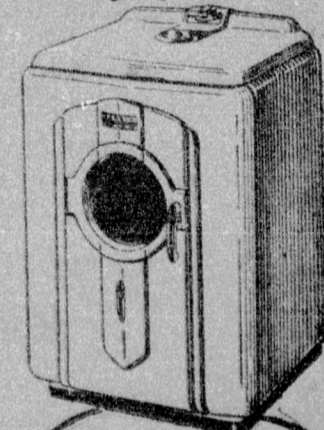
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
