Robeson and Wallace Appearances In Virginia Give Segregation Set-Back

Richmond, Va. (ANP) — The appearance of Paul Robeson and Wallace in Virginia recently at other places where mixed audiences gathered, the appearance of former Vice President Henry A. Wallace in Norfolk, Va., where Virginia's racial segregation law was defied, and of the visit of the Freedom Train in Charlottesville, Lynchburg, Roanoke, Norfolk and this city in recent weeks where in some cases segregation was set back in favor of the occasion, is beginning to reflect itself.

Raleigh Man Is Seeking Permanent Injunction

Richmond, Va. (NNPA) — United States District Judge Albert V. Bryan last Wednesday granted a temporary injunction restraining the Seaboard Air Line Railway, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers and its local lodges at Portsmouth and Norfolk, Virginia, from practicing race discrimination against colored firemen.

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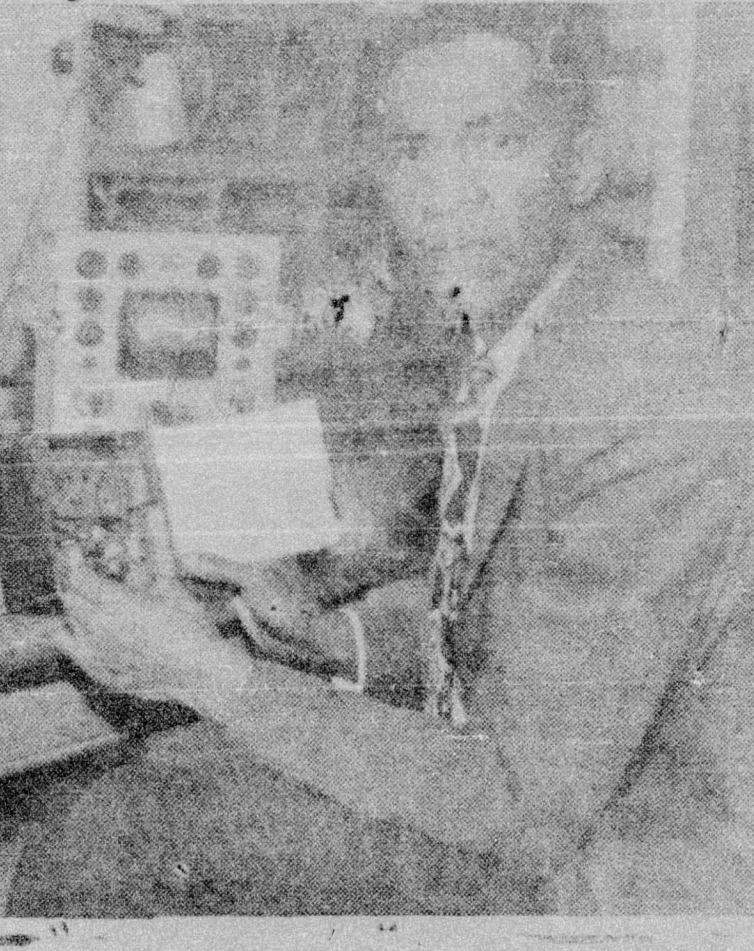
