JUDGE DISMISSES SUIT AGAINST JOE LOUIS

NEW YORK (NPA) — A writ of attachment lying up the purse won by Joe Louis, the heavyweight champion, in his fight with Jersey Joe Walcott has been vacated by Supreme Court Justice James B. McNeely as a result of agreement of the parties. It was learned last Monday.

The writ was obtained by Louis' wife, Marva Trotter Barrow (last name is Barrow), in connection with a suit for \$30,000 for "money loaned." It was served on the head of the Twentieth Century Sporting Club, which promoted the bout, immediately after the fight.

The order vacating the attachment was signed as a result of a stipulation entered into with Mrs. Barrow's counsel, which said "in consideration of the sum of \$10,000, the sum of \$30,000, which includes costs and disbursement paid by the defendant to the plaintiff, the suit against him is settled and discontinued."

NEGRO MOTHER AGAINST BIAS MILITARY DRAFT

NEW YORK (NPA) — Immediate action by Negro mothers against possible congressional enactment of a permanent Jim Crow military draft was urged Saturday by Mrs. Emma Clarissa Clement of Louisville, 72-year-old American Mother of 1946 and first Negro to be selected for this award by the Golden Rule foundation.

In a Christmas statement released in New York by the Committee Against Jim Crow in Military Service and Training, Mrs. Clement charged that pending legislation for universal military training would subject Negro youth to a year or more of service in Jim Crow army camps, inferior accommodations and inferior transportation through southern states.

"To us who had sons in the first war," Mrs. Clement stated, "there

can be effective. The Committee Against Jim Crow in Military Service and Training is leading the national fight to block passage of the bill until provisions are made for equality for all. The committee is demanding that our boys who suffered in a Jim Crow army in World War II be given a chance to tell their story before the committee in congress.

It is up to us to let our congressmen know that we as mothers oppose a bill which would betray our sons and the best interest of our nation. The time is short, and I call upon all mother and other decent-minded persons to use the Christmas holidays and the early part of January to force this issue out into the open. If we do not act now, it may be too late a few weeks from now."

Grant Reynolds, New York State Commissioner of Correction, is national chairman of the Committee Against Jim Crow in Military Service and Training, composed of 200 Negro leaders. A Philip Randolph, international president of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, is national treasurer. Dr. Rufus E. Clement, president of Atlanta University and one of seven chairmen of Mrs. Clement, is serving on the committee, which maintains headquarters at 217 West 125th Street, New York City.

ATLA. CITIZENS GET \$710,000 FOR RECREATION

ATLANTA (NPA) — The expenditure of some \$710,000 for parks and other recreational facilities for colored people in Atlanta and Fulton County in the near future is contemplated by city and county governments.

City Council approved an appropriation of \$150,000 of bond funds for such parks at its meeting last Monday.

The subcommittee recommended that city and county governments appropriate \$450,000 of bond money — \$225,000 each — for two colored parks within the city limits. Of that total, it is recommended that \$70,000 be set aside and used to purchase a park site to be located in the area of the Cotton School and the remainder to be used for developing a park near the Croftman School. After completion of the Croftman development, any money left over will be used in the section beyond Capital View.
