Louis To Fight In June

NEW YORK-(ANP) -AIthough final papers have not yet been signed, it is reported that heavyweight champion Joe Leuis has come to an agreement with the 20th-Century Sporting club, headed by "Uncle" Mike Jacobs, to dedend his title in New York sometime in June, acctrding to Sol Strauss, spokesman for Jacobs. Louis will receive 40 per cent of the gate, plus a cut in the radio, picture and television take.

The speedy action by the Jacobs interests was taken to short circuit a Jan. 18 conference with Herman Taylor relative to a Louis-Walcott bout in Philadelphia and other nettistion; by representatives of the Yankes stadium and the Polo grounds, who were seeking to promote a title bout in New York. Walcott however, has been holding that for more than a 20 oer cent cut. If is expected that he will eventually sign for the figure since 20 percent will run into big money.
