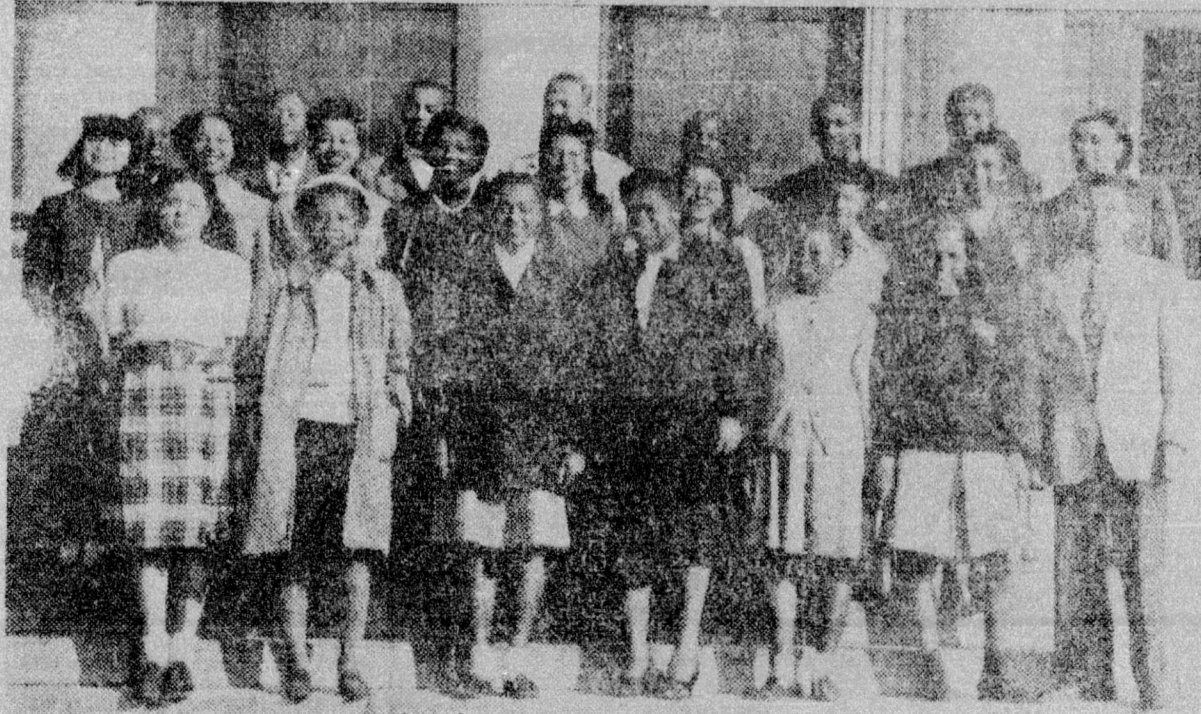

BURJIN, Germany (G) — The U. S. Army has clamped a heavy handed censorship on all books and magazines which supply information centers in the American occupied section of Europe. The Army has dropped all books by American authors. This action was taken to appease southern Senators, and representatives, who threatened to slash the Army and Military Government's appropriation unless the books were removed from the shipping list.
