Survivors Of Retired Employees Urged To File Claim Benefits

RALEIGH — John Ingle, manager of the Raleigh field office of the Social Security Administration Friday urged all retired workers and survivors of deceased wage earners to file claims promptly...

Monthly retirement benefits are payable to an insured wage earner when he is 65 or older and stops working to his wife when she is 60, and to his unmarried dependent children under 18.

Monthly benefits may be payable to certain survivors of insured workers no matter at what age the worker dies to his unmarried widow at age 65, to his widow of any age caring for a child entitled to benefits if she has not remarried, and to dependent parents at age 65 when neither widow nor child survive who might become entitled.

A single payment can be made when an insured person leaves no survivor immediately eligible for monthly payments at the time of his death. This lump sum payment may go to the widow or widower who was living with the deceased wage earner at the time of his or her death or, if the worker is not survived by any such relative, to any person who paid the burial expense.

An amendment to the Social Security Act in 1945 entitles survivors of World War II veterans to receive benefits if the veteran died within three years after his separation from service providing he served any time on or after September 16, 1940, and before the official end of World War II, and had ninety days of active service in the armed forces. Discharge must have been under conditions other than dishonorable.
