No Negro On Richmond Organization slate In Council Elections

RICHMOND (AP) — Richmond Citizens association ignored Howard H. Conville's wife that he would fight the organization's entire slate of candidates for the City council last week if it contained no Negro member. The association named a slate of nine candidates without a single Negro.

Mr. Conville, a local white attorney, was an unsuccessful candidate for the House of Delegates of Virginia last fall. He is considered one of the most liberal white politicians in the state.

The association's candidates bring the number now running for the new 9-man unicameral council up to 22. Three Negro candidates have already entered the race. They are Oliver W. Hill, prominent attorney; Samuel Kelley, and Lynwood E. Smith.
