

## Two Women Locked Up For Testifying in Court

Fayetteville — Miss Margie Carter and Miss Esther Mae Kuylen, who had charged Robert L. Copland, white soldier, with assault, were locked up in the Cumberland County Jail by order of Judge Luther Hamilton here recently after they had repeated from the witness stand indecent words which the soldier addressed to them.

They were walking along Person Street near the "half way bridge," according to testimony when they were stopped by a white soldier who made an indecent proposal to them.

When they repeated the indecent words the soldier addressed to them at the request of the solicitor, Judge Hamilton called Sheriff N. H. McGeachy and ordered him to lock them up in jail where they remained until court adjourned.

Copland who chased the women when they refused to submit to his advances was found guilty and fined \$30 and costs of court.

## North State G's Get Low Down On Summer Work and Vacations

Raleigh — World War II veterans attending schools, colleges and universities in North Carolina under the so-called G. I. Bill of Rights will receive automatic subsistence payments for 16 days after the spring sessions end, but will not be eligible for servicemen's readjustment allowances under the G. I. bill while receiving the subsistence allowances.

This announcement is made by Henry E. Kendall, chairman of the Employment Security Commission of North Carolina, which administers this provision of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944 under direction of the Veterans Administration.

Students under this program should make sure their G. I. subsistence payments have stopped before they file claim for unemployment allowances, since, in cases of deliberate attempts to defraud, there may be a fine or jail penalty for drawing "over-current payments," as well as the forfeiture of all rights under the readjustment allowance program.

Veterans are reminded also that they are required to apply for jobs be available for workable to work and willing to take suitable jobs before they are eligible to unemployment allowances during their vacation periods. They are required to show that they've actually sought work on their own initiative. The Commissioner's North Carolina State Employment Service Division is not able to locate jobs for them.

Moreover, Chairman Kendall points out, veterans are not expected to be "choosy" in the types of jobs they will accept, since at best their work will be temporary, if they plan to reenter school in the fall. Normally such jobs as those found in farming, food processing, vacation resorts, lumbering and other seasonal work will be considered suitable for temporary jobs for most student veterans.

## Quiz Six Negroes In Shooting Of Reuther

DETROIT (AP) — With questioning of Frank Van Hook last week police brought the total number of six Negroes who have been quizzed in connection with the recent shooting of Walter P. Reuther, President of the United Auto Workers (CIO) union.

Police seem to have temporarily forgotten about the report by witnesses that three white men were seen driving away from the scene of the shooting on the fatal night.

Van Hook was recognized by someone the police called the "Taleo informant." This informant, the police say, told them that the man identified carried a .38 caliber pistol and vowed to shoot Reuther on sight.

## TRAINMAN WINS COURT'SY AWARD

A. Charlie Linton, train porter on the Man o' War of the Central of Georgia Railway, has received the first railroad Employee's Courtesy Award presented by the Federation for Railway Progress.

The award, a \$25 U. S. Savings Bond, is presented each month to a railroad employee responsible for an outstanding example of good passenger relations, and is designed to encourage courtesy and thoughtfulness on the part of all railroad employees who come in contact with the public.

The basis of the award is the passenger service reports received by the Federation's Passenger Relations Department, established early last summer, has since that time processed more than 1500 comments from American travelers who have offered compliments, complaints, and suggestions about the railroad service they receive.
