One involves the levying of fines upon states, counties or municipalities, permitting lynchings to occur; the other makes lynching, now legally murder, a special federal offense.

They advocate a measure which would provide federal penalties against individual peace officers, state, county or city, who connive in a lynching—but that's all.

Backers of the present bill are unwilling to make such a concession, saying that would be equivalent to "destroying" the measure. What action will be taken awaits the decision of the senate GOP conference, which has placed discussion of the measure at the top of its calendar.

FILE SUIT IN VOTE

plaint further charged that Registrar Sanders "did not register as qualified voters white citizens and residents of the said town, who possess the same qualifications required of registrants as are possessed by the plaintiffs and other Negroes similarly situated in said town."

BASED ON FACTS

Charging that Sanders refused to register the complainants was based "solely and wholly" on their race or color, the complaint charged that the denial constitutes a "violation of the Constitution and laws of both the United States and the State of North Carolina."

The members of the County Board of Elections were charged with failing to review Sanders' actions "despite overwhelming evidence of arbitrariness and willful discrimination based solely on race or color."

The plaintiffs asked the court for a judgement declaring that the failure and refusal of the defendants to register qualified Negroes to be a violation of law and that an order be issued to "let such discrimination."

Issuance of an order requiring the immediate registration of the plaintiffs and other Negroes as well as payment of court costs was asked.

The North Carolina State Supreme Court refused to revoke a lower court decision which denied the damages on the grounds that the bus dispatcher who obtained the warrant against the Rev. Mr. Priggen was not acting in an agent of the company.

Dr. Tobias has also been a member of such bodies as the National Selective Service Board, the joint Army and Navy Committee on Welfare and Recreation and the Mayor's Committee on Unity in New York City. In 1944 he resigned from the New York State Committee on Discrimination and Employment following refusal of the Governor to implement the committee's recommendations.

For many years he was a senior secretary for the national Y. M. C. A., which position he left in 1946 to become the first Negro director of the Phelps-Stokes Fund. He is chairman of the Board of Trustees of Hampton Institute, Hampton, Va., and a member of the Howard University board.

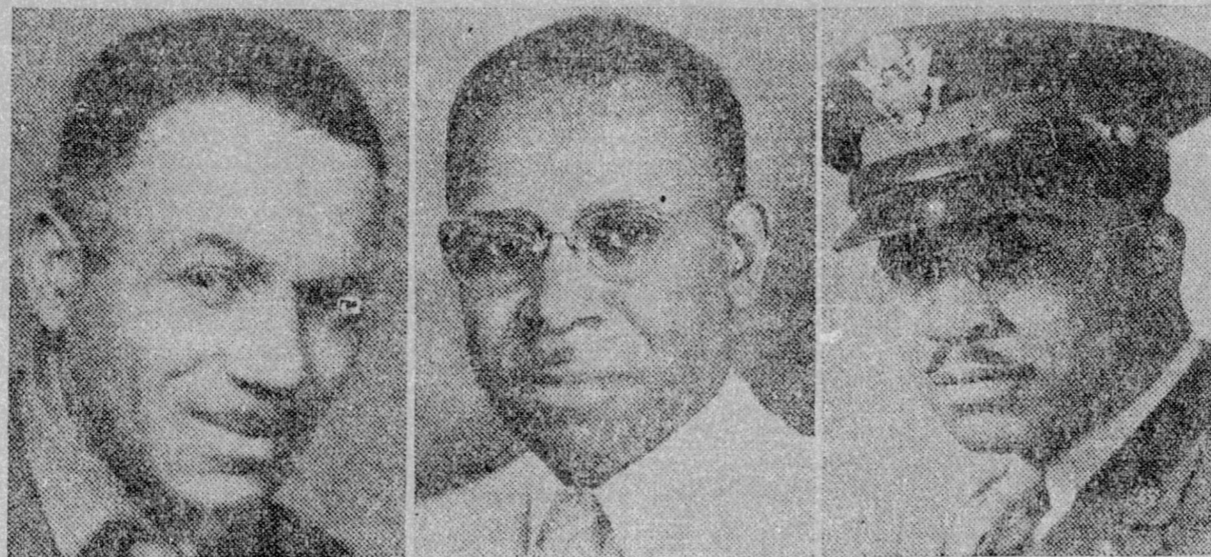
After walking into police headquarters to surrender, however, Harris denied that he had ever been to the ball park.

Magistrate Rainey, president of the Philadelphia NAACP, is a grandson of one of the first Negro Congressmen in the United States (Joseph H. Rainey of South Carolina). He is running in Philadelphia's 4th C.D. Dr. Camper, a co-chairman of the Progressive Party of Maryland, is a graduate of Howard University Medical School and a practicing physician in Baltimore where he is campaigning in the 4th C.D. Dr. Campbell, New Party candidate in New Jersey's 11th C.D., is also a graduate of Howard University, a veteran of four years army service and a practicing dentist. Margaret Bush Wilson is the New Party Congressional candidate in Missouri's 11th C.D. She is the first Negro Woman Congressional candidate in the history of the state.

ister's taking a public stand in support of the candidacy of Wallace, in opposition to the draft, or against racial segregation and discrimination.

The church's action was evidently provoked by the progressively more reactionary Atlanta Constitution, which on April 1 published a "news" story: "Wallace's Church Votes Negro Ban." That action had actually taken place five months earlier.

"We do not know the merits of the case, and are not interested in reaching any decision about this one," editorialized the Constitution following the "no confidence" vote in Domas. "We think it obvious that any minister who chooses a highly controversial political position must run the risk of losing the confidence of his flock."

In a letter-to-the-editor, Rev. Domas cited the fact that last year delegates from some 20 southern cities had joined in a national Unitarian resolution "Toward an Unsegregated Church in an Unsegregated Society."

To this the Constitution sanctimoniously replied: "While most other southern churches do not have Negroes in their membership, they do not prohibit Negroes from visiting in the galleries."

In recognition of his outstanding service to boys, Boys' Clubs of America awards him the Boys' Club Silver Key-stone.

Dom Basil Matthews, Negro priest, member of Trinidad's inter-racial Benedictine Abbey and founder of the Institute of Social Research at the Abbey is one of 40 international authorities on special fields listed in the latest supplement of the "International Who's Who."

This brochure gives biographical sketches of 225 persons, but only 40 of whom Dom Basil is ever mentioned for publication in the next biennial volume of "Who's Who." He is given as an authority on anthropology, culture patterns in the Caribbean and on Gregorian music.

Dom Basil studied at Lourain University and later at Fordham where he took bachelor's and master's degrees. He was for a year assistant professor of religion at Manhattanville College, New York, and in 1942 he was awarded a fellowship by the Rockefeller Foundation for research in social science in the Caribbean. He wrote a thesis based on this research for his doctorate of philosophy at Fordham.

Wellesley, Mass. 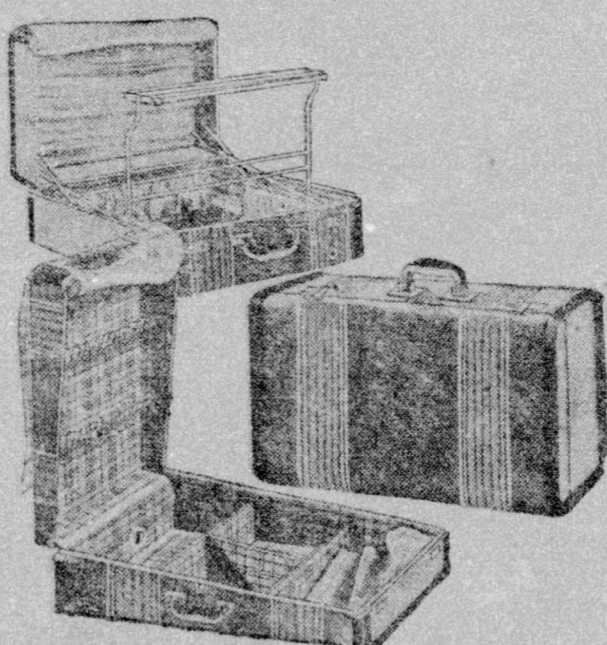
