HAMPTON, Va. — Twenty-four cadets from Hampton Institute's Regular Army of Reserve Commissioned by Col. Richard H. Granger, Professor of Military Science and Tactics, during the school's 73rd Annual Commencement Program in Ogden Hall Monday morning.

The cadets had been sworn in at a special ceremony earlier in the same morning. In presenting the commissions, Col. Granger said that it was the first time in the history of Hampton Institute that such a step had been made.

G. FLEMING WINNER OF HAMPTON INST. ALUMNI AWARD

HAMPTON, Va. — The Hampton Institute Alumni Award, given annually to an alumna judged by the administration, was made an outstanding contribution in his profession or work, was presented to George Fleming by Dr. Channing H. Tobias, Chairman of the Hampton Institute Board of Trustees, at the School's Commencement Exercises Monday, May 31.

Now Secretary of the Race Relations Committee of the American Friends Service Committee, Mr. Fleming was singled out for the award because of his distinguished career as a journalist and civil servant, and especially for his contributions to the work of the Y.P.C.C. He is the president of the Philadelphia, Pa. chapter of the Hampton Alumni Association, and is noted for his efforts on behalf of the school.

The Hampton Alumni Award, presented last year to Arthur B. Davis, Professor of English at Howard University, is a bronze plaque inscribed on one side with a list of the school's Memorial Church and on the other side the sentence, "I learned at Hampton that those who are happiest are those who do the most for others."

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
