

President Bluford Pleads For Greater Bldg. Program For Greensboro College

GREENSBORO — President F. D. Bluford of the Agricultural and Technical College of North Carolina, in his Annual Report to the College Board of Trustees recently made a strong appeal for a greater building program for the college, regular increase in salaries, and equalization of Negro College Teachers' salaries with those of white institutions in keeping with training, skill and services rendered.

"Although a strong plea was made to the Budget Commission and to the legislature for permanent dormitories for our students," he said, "nothing was done to relieve this situation. Only two dormitories have been built on our campus in the last 47 years."

He further stated that the college had permanent dormitories for only 600 students, while more than 1,300 students are now living in dilapidated army barracks and temporary buildings supplied wholly by the Federal Government and the college, without any end whatsoever to the State.

"More than 700 students are living in homes in the city, many of them from a financial side as well as from the unsanitary conditions and unwholesome social surroundings. I fear that A. and T. College will not be able to continue to attract students unless something is done to improve housing conditions."

Concluding this report to the Board of Trustees, President Bluford expressed his great appreciation to the members for their helpful cooperation and their wise council by saying:

DAYTON DOCTORS STICK TO GUNS IN JIM CROW FIGHT

Dayton, O. (ANP) — In an unprecedented action here the Montgomery County Medical Society (MCMS) refused to hold its annual spring golf tournament at two different local golf clubs because they discriminated against Negroes.

The two guilty clubs were the Dayton Country club and the Miami Valley Country club. The MCMS has planned to send letters to the two country clubs protesting their Jim Crow activities.

The golf tournament was cancelled, and the society will hold a dinner at a downtown club instead.

This is the first time in Dayton in many years that a professional group has stood by its members when a social activity has been hampered by Jim Crow activity. Most of them tell the colored members too bad, but you know how it is. The MCMS has no racial restrictions on its membership.

\$1,200 ADAM HAT AWARD GOES TO KANSAS CITY MAN

NEW YORK — A \$1,200 Adam Hat award was made to Thomas V. Lester, Executive Secretary, Urban League, Kansas City, for special training in the field of employment and labor relations at the University of Chicago. It was announced here last week by the National Urban League.

43 GRADUATE AT PALMER FINALS

Sedalia (ANP) — Dr. Mardecia Wyatt Johnson, president of Howard University, delivered the commencement address here Monday to 43 students comprising the graduating class at Palmer Memorial Institute.

Speaking on a theme of "Watch, For Ye Know Not The Day Nor Hour," Dr. Johnson placed emphasis on the changing concept of democracy and the opportunities open to members of the Negro race.

"Train your minds and hearts to service in uplifting the Negro race," he said. "The forces of prejudice and hate which have permeated church and state are abominations in the sight of God, who eventually chose another people to become the moral leaders of the world."

A highlight at the graduation exercises came when President Charlotte Hawkins Brown announced that parents of graduates had contributed more than \$1,000 in gifts to the endowment fund. Valetorian was Walter Hugh Pattillo of Tarboro, a five year student who led his class in scholastic achievement in each of those years. Lauree Griffin of Whiteville was salutatorian.

ROYAL REFUSES OK FOR INTEGRATED MINN. GUARD UNIT

St. Paul, Minn. (ANP) — Gov. Luther W. Youngdahl of Minnesota said last week that Secy. of the Army Kenneth G. Royall had refused his request to okay an unsegregated national guard in Minnesota. The governor appealed to the state's congressman to protect the state's National guard federal funds during his campaign to integrate Negroes into the local units.

The governor has indicated that whether Royall approves or not Minnesota will eventually have an unsegregated guard.

WDL COMMENTS SENATOR LANGER

New York City (WDL) — Rev. Donald Harrington, national chairman of the Workers Defense League, who recently along with A. Philip Randolph picketed the White House in opposition to a Jim Crow draft, has wired Sen. or William Langer congratulating him for his stand on the issue.

Senator Langer announced recently that he would incorporate in draft legislation all the anti-Jim Crow provisions contained in the Truman civil rights program.

Wake County 4-H Clubs Conduct May Picnics

Eleven of Wake County's 15 Negro 4-H Clubs planned and conducted local 4-H picnics during the month of May, which was a phase of their yearly planned 4-H activities.

The picnics were conducted on the local school grounds except for the Riley Hill Club which had its picnic at Rocky Branch, a community picnic ground.

All picnic programs had to do with forms of recreation and the menus varied with chicken, potato salad, wieners, sandwiches, punch, cakes, bottle drinks, and ice cream.

Clubs involved were Juniper Level, Springfield, Eagle Rock, Wendell, Sandy Fork, Jefferies Grove, Cary, New Hill, Pine View, Riley Hill and Pleasant Union. The Pleasant Union Club entertained the local PTA.

All Wake County Clubs are planning for the County-wide 4-H Picnic at Chavis Park, Friday, June 18, 9:30 a.m. to 5:00.

Judge Times Decision For Opening of JC Pool

East Rutherford, N. J. (WDL) — District Judge Dominick Marconi waited two and a half months until the day before the opening of Palisades Pool to dismiss a case in which Miss Melba Valle, a Negro, charged she had been refused admission last summer in violation of the state law. He had heard the case early in February. Then, contrary to customary procedure, Judge Marconi refused to give a copy of his 10-page decision to Hiram Elfenbein, Workers Defense League attorney who handled Miss Valle's case, and told Elfenbein that he would have to send over a stenographer to copy it, since he had given all copies to the press. Elfenbein is confident of a reversal on appeal.

On the day the pool opened, interracial groups from the Committee of Racial Equality found that the pool's Jim Crow policy still prevails. The whites were admitted but the Negroes were barred.

PROGRESSIVE DEMOS 167 ARE AWARDED BACK PRES. TRUMAN FULL CITIZENSHIP

Columbia, S. C. (ANP) — Huge placards, advocating "full citizenship" for all citizens, dotted City auditorium here last week during the state convention of the Progressive Democratic party. Spaced at regular intervals around the auditorium, the placards proclaimed:

"Down with Half Citizenship," "We Want Truman—Not Thurmond," "South Carolina For Everyone," "Democrats First Class," "We Have Had Enough Balance," "Special Privileges For None," and "We Don't Want Your Son or Daughter, We Want Full Citizenship."

All the slogans, except the latter one were given extensive and unbiased coverage by the local press and radio. The last one, however, was totally ignored by the entire local press.

Thirty one of the state's 49 counties were represented by over 200 persons. The auditorium was decorated with state flags and festoons of banners. The U. S. flag hung from the ceiling along with a life sized photograph of President Truman. Representatives from AP, UP and special reporters from the three major dailies attended the convention.

The delegates refused, according to instructions, to take the new oath made during the state convention of the South Carolina Democratic party a week before to the effect that "I believe in social, religious, and racial segregation." This oath has already caused much dissension throughout the state because of federal employees being required to swear to work for election of primary nominees. Among religious groups, the contention is held that if religious segregation is carried to its logical end, it would separate not only Negroes and whites, but every other racial segment of the state's population.

In apparent answer to the rival party's stamping and rallying songs, "Let's Send Harry Back to the Farm," the Progressives sang, "Let's Send Truman Back to the White House."

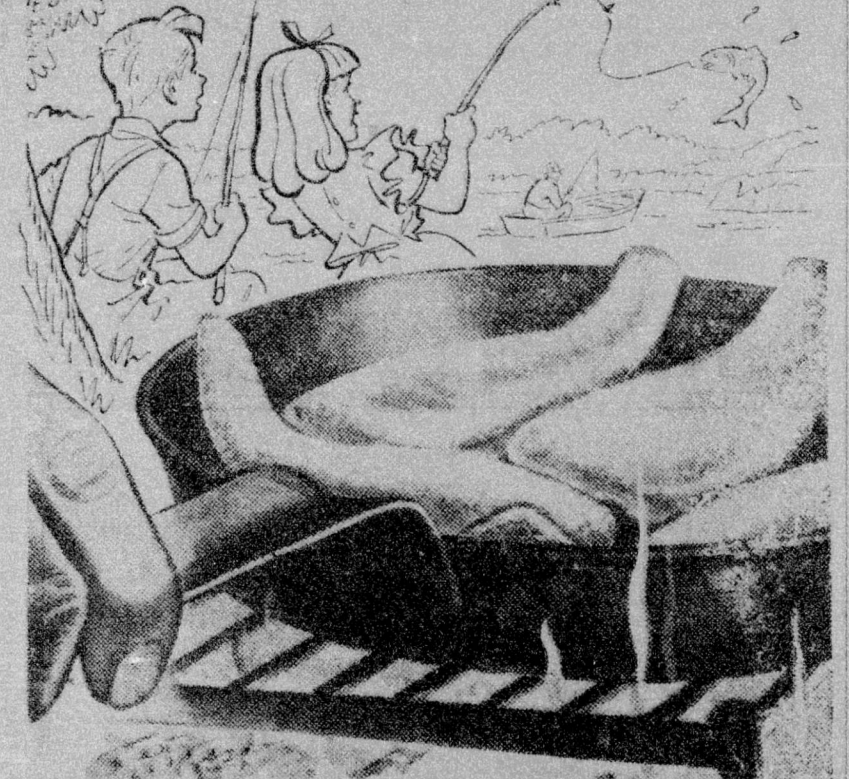
