MONROVIA (AP) — Series of entertainments were staged in honor of American Minister and Mrs. Raphael O'Hara Lanier last week marking a gesture of appreciation for their congenial stay in Liberia.

Entertainments included a buffet luncheon by Secretary of Public Instruction and Mrs. J. W. Pearson, by Vice President and Mrs. C. L. Simpson and also Chief Justice and Mrs. L. A. Gaines, breakfast by Secretary of Labor and Mrs. S. D. Coleman, bon voyage party by State Secretary and Mrs. Gabriel Dennis, party by the Liberian American club and a dinner by the Liberian Roberts corporation at Roberts field.

The YWCA made a presentation to Mrs. Lanier at an exercise held Sunday at Cox Hall. Testimonials of the good work done here by the minister were given by the Liberian Press association and the West African Cultural association. Numerous letters of appreciation and gifts poured into the Legation from Liberians in all walks of life attending to the good will of the minister since his sojourn here.

LIBERIA COLLEGE CONFERS DEGREE

On Monday, June 7, before a packed audience inclusive of President Tubman, visitor Vice President Simpson, president of the board of trustees, cabinet officials, diplomatic officers, legislators, faculty and student body, Dr. T. E. Ward conferred the degree of Master of Arts in Education on Mrs. Lanier. The ceremony was presided over by the minister. Lanier's address of appreciation was a fitting climax to the event.

Vice President Simpson referred to the minister as a diplomat, statesman, educator and scholar. Dr. Ward recounted some of the many activities of Minister Lanier as related to the college, and the receipt of 100 new books gratuitally from a nucleus for the college of education in the new university, and to the memory of his mother, Mrs. Carrie Beall Lanier. President Tubman presented the diploma certifying to the degree, and spoke of the success of the mission of Minister Lanier.

President Tubman was host to an official state dinner at the executive mansion on the evening of June 7 when high officials of state, the diplomatic corps and distinguished citizens gathered to do honor to Minister and Mrs. Lanier.

During the course of the evening President Tubman as Grandmaster of the Order of the Star of Africa, invested the minister with the Knight of the Grand Band.

# Local Man Now Studying at ARC School in Tenn.

NASHVILLE, Tenn. — Sylvester Martin Wright, representative from the Wake County Red Cross Chapter is attending the American National Red Cross Aquatic School at Tennessee A & I State College, Nashville, Tennessee, from June 21 through July 1. It has been reported.

The primary purpose of the school is to train leadership in the first aid, water safety, and accident prevention programs.

Here, selected individuals representing Red Cross chapters, schools, colleges, and other organizations participate in an intensive 10-day program to prepare these programs upon their return to their home camp, or to their assumed leadership in school.

# Summer Workshop At NCC Is Now Underway

Durham — One of the most interesting features of the Summer session at North Carolina College here is the health education workshop for teachers for principals and teachers from elementary schools in all sections of North Carolina.

Most of the workshop problems center around school and home sanitation, school health services, curriculum developments, a healthy living and community resources.

During the two weeks that the workshop has been in action the students have listened to discussions on the various phases of health education from authorities in the field, and have visited various institutions for first hand knowledge of health facilities.

Guest speakers have been officials of the Durham City County Health Department, local and state health educators and representatives of the police department who discussed health education in terms of a safety program. Representatives of public libraries, the Durham ministerial alliance, and Young Women's Christian Association, have also pointed out the part their institutions can play in enriching the community program through serving as community resources.

On June 12 through 15, all students in the class had complete physical examinations at Lincoln Hospital under the supervision of Dr. L. R. Swift and Dr. R. P. Randolph, and on Wednesday, June 16, the workshop participants observed physical examinations of children in the demonstration school.

According to Mrs. Sankie Floyd, director of the workshop, these examinations were designed to emphasize the role of a complete physical examination in evaluating personal health. This also serves to develop in the participants an appreciation of what constitutes a good physical examination and serves as a spring board for emphasis on health before branching into community health problems.

In addition to Mrs. Floyd, the workshop staff consists of B. T. McMillan, assistant director; Vance Chavis, instructor; Miss Thelma Heavis, instructor; Mrs. Georgia Berbe and Miss Thelma Turnage, advisors; and Mrs. Thelma Morris, Miss Esther Henry, and Mrs. Ruth Bibby, consultants.

# Shaw Officials on Leave
