WEST ST. VETERANS SHOWING PROGRESS IN MASONRY CLASSES

The veterans class in brickmasonry at the West Street School has been making remarkable progress under the direction of J. L. Carrings of this week.

The older members of the vet's class have advanced in trade theory to the place where they can do a very good job of planning a house floor plan, with special stress on economy of space, and room convenience. They can estimate with a better-than-average degree of accuracy the amount of bricks, blocks, concrete, sand and mortar necessary for an average size home.

They have drawn several floor plans, and in so doing have used the one inch, one half inch, and one-quarter inch scales. They can read simple blue print plan views.

Along with their theory, they have had quite extensive practice in the shop and on permanent jobs.

The masonry work on the new principal's office was done by veterans. This includes the squaring, leveling, excavating, and pouring of the concrete footing and floor. The partition walls are of masonry construction.

The veterans played a major part in the construction of the recreation building sponsored by the Civic League. This building is far from complete. However, what labor has been used thus far, both skilled and unskilled, has for the most part, been that of veterans, except for a creditable amount of help contributed by the school class at the beginning of the building.

Sudanese Natives Take First Step To Win Independence

London (G) - The 700,000 North Africans in the Sudan, living in 1900 square miles of territory, will begin the first leg of their self government at once as the result of an ordinance creating an Executive Council and an elected Legislative Assembly. Governor General Sir Robert Howe, whom the British gave permission to act on the matter without Egyptian cooperation, promulgated the Ordinance last week. Egyptian and British sources govern the Sudan as a condominium, but Egypt has not yet approved of the draft of the Ordinance.

VETS WALK OUT OF JIM CROW SCHOOL

NEW ORLEANS (ANP) - Protesting against conditions at the school, 50 veterans including two ex-WAC's, walked out of class last week at the Tri State College of Industrial Arts for Negroes in New Orleans.

Dissatisfaction among students at the six month old school has been hinted during the past few weeks. Among the reports of student charges are:

A number of veterans have complained about the white workers in the school administrative offices. These workers are charged with being "padding" in students. Recently students petitioned for mass on the second floor to combat the excessive heat. The school has an enrollment of 700 students mainly in the field of tailoring.

Raw Foods and Fresh Milk Ward Off Ulcers

Stanford U., Calif. (G) - If you are wary of stomach ulcers, you may do well to include raw foods and fresh milk in your diet.

For tests conducted by a scientist at the Stanford University School of Medicine indicate that a diet rich in "Vitamin U," found in raw foods and milk but deficient in heated foods, reduce peptic ulcer occurrence in guinea pigs.

The importance of the findings reported in the current issue of the Stanford Medical Bulletin will depend on whether the human stomach behaves exactly like that of guinea pigs. But the scientist, Dr. Garnett Cheney, believes the results of his experiments on guinea pigs warrant carefully controlled diet studies of human ulcer patients.

In his research of the university clinical professor of medicine profited from earlier work in which he and other scientists had determined that "Vitamin U," the anti-ulcer factor, is found in alfalfa, kale, lettuce, cabbage and other fresh greens; cereal grasses; fresh milk and raw egg yolks; wheat bran; soybean and olive oils; and liver fat.

In commenting on the research which emphasized prevention rather than cure, Dr. Cheney stated: "The fact that the anti-ulcer factor is so readily destroyed by heat brings up the intriguing question of whether or not the increasing number of patients with peptic ulcers may, in part, be due to the heat processing of their food supply and their small intake of raw foods."

Only a series of closely observed dietary studies on patients with chronic recurrent peptic ulcer can settle this question.

Blind Ex-Slave Has 102nd Birthday

ST. LOUIS (ANP) - A woman ex-slave who had been blind for the past 23 years, celebrated what is believed to be her 102 birthday here last week at the home of her son and daughter-in-law. The woman is Mrs. Lou Tyler, born into slavery on a plantation at Cadiz, Ky.

The date of her birth was entered in the family Bible of the plantation owner, she said. After she and her father had been freed, the two returned to the plantation and verified the birthdate. In recalling the day of her freedom, she said the plantation owner called all the slaves together and told them they were free. However, she and her grand father were permitted to remain on the place, but most of the others were dismissed with a piece of pork and some corn meal.

Blind since 1828, Mrs. Tyler has excellent hearing and gets about the house with the aid of two canes. She has lived in St. Louis since 1917 and is the mother of six children, two of whom are living, has six grandchildren, two great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.
