Wallace Supporters Support Ban On Bias

New York (ANP)—Backers of the Henry Wallace for President movement supported the ban on segregation in the armed forces with wires and letters to congressional political leaders, but nothing was done, national headquarters here said this week. The Harlem Women's Committee for Wallace wired Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York to urge New York Republicans in congress to vote for the amendment, but he did nothing, the group said. Mrs. Estelle Massey Osborne and George Murphy wrote and wired church, civic and local leaders in more than 30 states to support the Powell amendment to the draft act making segregation illegal in the armed forces.

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NASH PLANT TO HIRE NEGROES

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (ANP)—More jobs were opened to Negroes in Milwaukee last week when the sedan-body plant of the Nash-Kelvinator Corp. agreed to hire qualified employes.

This result was accomplished after several meetings between Dan Travis and company officials as well as between Travis and the UAW-IO Local. Travis, a local unionist, has been asked by the plant manager to provide the first Negro workers. He is now seeking good workers for the openings.

Interviews between Travis and several business firms, also resulted in the hiring of colored students during the school vacation period. Similar department store hired five girls last week.

Big New York Bank Hires Colored Clerk

New York City (G)—When Cecil Murrell was first interviewed for a position as clerk at the Merchants Bank of 434 Broadway, New York City, he was quietly told the position was already filled, although the CIO Financial Employees Guild had been advised that the position would be offered to a Negro applicant.

Quick action by the Employees Guild, prevented the Bank's officials from sabotaging all attempts to by-pass Negro applicants, although the bank had stated it would welcome Negro office workers. The office workers left their cashier cages, howled their protests and Murrell was hired.

Prior to these developments, the Royal Industrial Bank, 1136 Broadway, hired a Negro for a white-collar job for the first time in its history. The only other bank in New York to employ Negroes, was the Amalgamated Bank, 11 Union Square, where the Jim Crow policy has for several years, been blotted out.

Detroit Student Wins Harvard U. Scholarship

Detroit (ANP)—The valedictorian of the senior class at Northern high, James M. Harkless Jr., was one of two Detroit graduates who won scholarships to Harvard university, it was announced here last week.

This award was given to him along with a white student, Joseph Herbert Shaw of Northville, by the Eastern Michigan Harvard Alumni association. It will be renewable each year as long as he maintains a certain level of grades. Harkless plans to study law.
