ed invaders. Although the sheriff revealed that he has thrown all available deputies into the case and that "we think we are getting somewhere" he did not say just how far the case had progressed.

However, Solicitor Sullinger reported that the identity of the organization to which the hooded, uniformed raiders belonged, has still "not been established." McDowell went on to say that the initial report filed was only a "routine" description of the probe and did not mean that the case had been closed.

"We shall never close the case until it is solved," he said.

From the pulpit of the Edgewood Presbyterian church, white, the Rev. H. H. Barrett told his congregation that "things have happened in our city and nation which make us all feel uneasy and confused." He was speaking of both the hooded raid and the congressional vote for peacetime conscription. He added, "We must depend on God in the final analysis."

## SWEDES AMAZED

Kilroy, colored concert artist now in Sweden.

He lives here as the guest of a Swedish painter and his wife, the Karlmans. He first met them in Paris in 1947. Then they were in New York and introduced themselves with "Ar ni Indisk?" or "are you Indian in English?" Through trial and error with several languages which one of the other did not understand they finally became friends. The Karlmans invited him to visit them if he ever got to Sweden.

After being in Sweden for a week, his hosts had to go away on business, and he was left on his own. On his way home from a movie some young boys stopped him and said, "Hello, black boy, we like you. Where do you come from?"

When he said he came from America he noticed that the expression on their faces changed. They wondered whether he came from Harlem, then Boston and then hit the right place, Chicago. They also asked him about Lena Horne and Joe Louis.

Swedes Curious  
Of Sweden, Kilroy said, "Since I have been in Sweden I have found it somewhat like America. The Swedes pattern after America in many ways.

Most of the Swedes are very curious about colored Americans. They look, or rather, stare at Kilroy whenever he walks down the street. They walk past him and circle back and maybe ask him something in Swedish for curiosity. There are only about 12 Negroes in all of Sweden.

Many of their attitudes towards Negroes are guided by American movies. For instance one dialogue with a student of the University of Stockholm following a performance at the National went:

"You know Mr. Kilroy, it isn't often we see and get a chance to speak with colored people here in Sweden. Of course we read much about Negroes and see them in American films, but they are so different from what we read about.

"Would you call that propaganda that we receive from America on your people?"

"Maybe."

Another typical incident of how the Swedish have been impressed about colored people through communications rather than contact occurred on a movie lot of "filmen om Nalen" or "The Story of the National."

"Gentleman" Singer  
In the opening scene Kilroy was supposed to sing "A Gentleman" and dress the part of one. A wardrobe boy, however, tried to insist on his wearing a vagabond costume although the script did not call for such. Nearby was the assistant director who had lived in America for 14 years.

He called the colored singer and said, "Mr. Kilroy I think you are quite right, but I can assure you that the young man's intentions are good, that is I don't think he has any complexes or anything like that about you. You know like making you the Negro boy with the watermelon."

"Then," Kilroy said, "why does he want to give me clothes that are not right for this scene?"

"It's because he's new, only been with us a week now."

"Isn't he read the script?"

"Yes, that is, I think so. Don't you worry, I'll correct him."

On the whole, however, it seems that the Swedish people are curious, nice and still amazed to see colored people. Kilroy has had a chance to meet many of them. He has been featured in several of their magazines and newspapers. He has also made several movie appearances. He has also been featured on the nationwide radio network.

He said that he would very much like to tour America and tell the people how the Swedes as well as how other peoples of Europe see the Negro.

## Mrs. Wallace Honored

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Mrs. Henry Wallace, wife of the third party candidate for President, was the guest of honor at a special luncheon June 19 at the Kingsway hotel. Mrs. Wallace stopped in St. Louis for a two day visit June 18 and 19.

Chairman of the luncheon, sponsored by the women of the Progressive party of Missouri was Mrs. Fannie Cook, author. Main speaker was Mrs. Margaret Harris, chairman of the sponsoring group.

## TRAILWAYS ADD 24 NEW BUSES

Carolina Trailways is adding 24 new air conditioned buses to its new post-war fleet, according to an announcement by R. C. Hoffman, Jr., President of this coach firm. Twelve of these buses are already in service on the routes served by Carolina Trailways and the remaining 12 are expected from the factory early in July, Mr. Hoffman said.

All of these new buses are powered with the latest type diesel engines which provide more power and quieter operation over engine-horsepower employed. They also have vast other improvements in engineering and interior appointments.

These buses were manufactured by General Motors Corporation, Coach Division, and cost this company \$560,000. Mr. Hoffman also states that his company has put into service over two and one-quarter million dollars worth of new buses since the war's end.

REPLACEMENT  
These new buses were bought, Mr. Hoffman stated, to replace some obsolete equipment and to provide ample seating capacity for profits of peak travel such as holidays and week-ends; and to make available sufficient buses to enable special groups to secure charter service to any destination.

The air conditioning units on these new buses are the most advanced mobile type and were installed by Ingersoll Rand and the Waukesha Engine Company under the direct engineering supervision of General Motors Corporation. These units operate independently of the main bus motor, and for that reason air conditioning can be used while buses are parked or standing at terminal platforms.

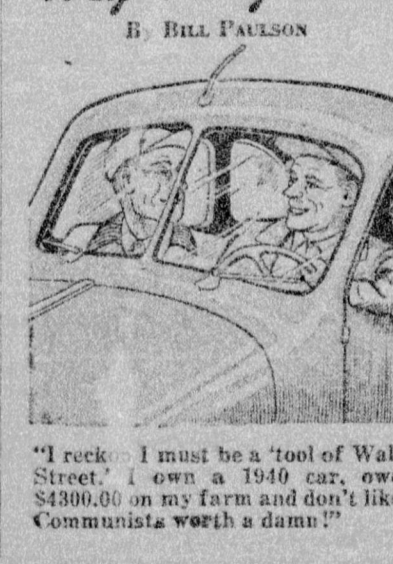
Twelve of these have seats for 37 passengers, while 12 of them will comfortably seat 41 passengers. All interiors are roomy and contain new style form fitting seats for added comfort. The front windshield of these buses is so designed that no glare from oncoming road traffic enters the buses to distract passengers or drivers.

With these new buses, Carolina Trailways now operates 241 buses over roads in North Carolina and that this Company, in 1947, transported 11,000,000 passengers.

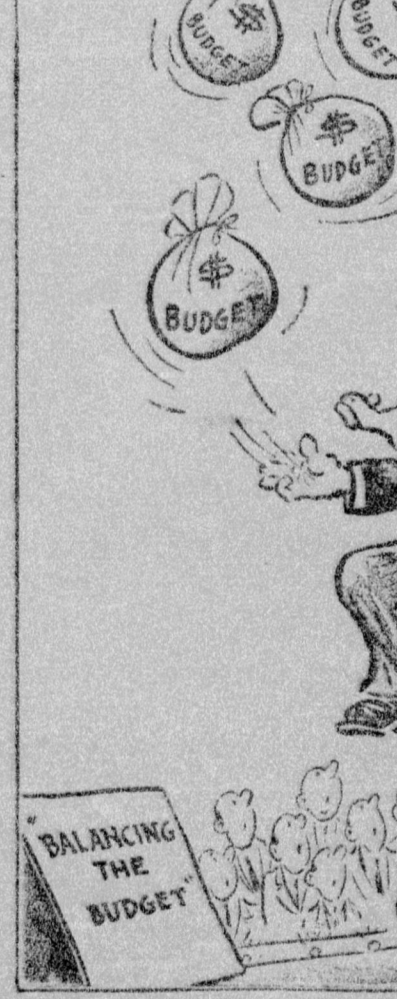

## HARNETT MAN SHOT TO DEATH

LILLINGTON — David Crudup, 23-year-old Lillington man, was shot and instantly killed here Sunday afternoon and according to officers, his assailants left him dead on the highway.

Called for slaying Crudup, James Grace, 28, also of Lillington, was picked up three hours after the shooting by highway patrolman as he was walking along the Lillington-Sanford highway.

The slaying is allegedly the climax of Crudup's attention to Grace's wife, and occurred at the intersection of Highway 16-A and 421, one mile north of town. Crudup was struck in the face by the load from a 12-gauge shotgun and died instantly.

Grace threw the gun away after the slaying, but later led officers to it. He is now in jail without bond pending hearing.

## DR. JERNAGIN QUILTS COUNCIL

WASHINGTON — Dr. William H. Jernagin, one of the founders of the National Fraternal Council of Negro Churches, Inc. USA, and former officer, his assailants left him dead on the highway.

The announcement was contained in an official statement signed by Dr. J. M. Bracy, president; Bishop W. J. Walls, vice president; and Dr. C. T. Murray, bureau director; Dr. J. H. Whitfield, secretary of the Testimonial Committee; and Dr. Augustus Lewis, treasurer.

Dr. Jernagin's resignation was finally accepted with the understanding that he occupy the position of bureau consultant, and he agreed to serve in this position. Dr. C. T. Murray, pastor of the Vermont Avenue Baptist Church, was elected to serve as director of the bureau until the mid-winter executive board meeting.

A testimonial for faithful and constant service will be given Dr. Jernagin at the Mt. Carmel Baptist Church here at 8:00 p. m. on July 10.

Dr. Thomas Fortune Fletcher of Addis Ababa, and his administrative aide, William Howard, are set for a trek to Cairo and parts of India. The two public servants of Haile Selassie are of the staff of the Madhane-Alem School for Boys. Fletcher is a native of Nicholasville, Ky., and Howard is from Athens, Georgia.

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
