Fayetteville Personalities

The Rev. Myles Andrew J. Rhynes, dean of Negro poets in North Carolina seen here in his weekly broadcast over Fayetteville's new radio station WWNC 1230 K. C. sponsored by the Fayetteville Ministerial Alliance.

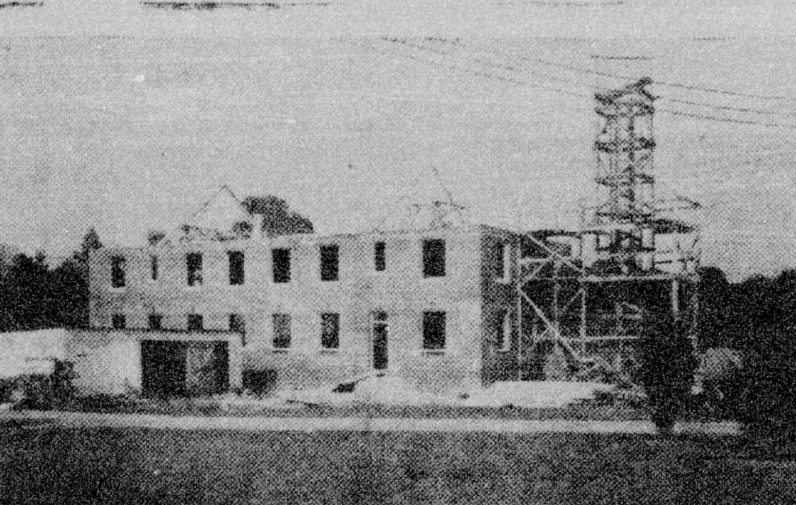
The well-known poet preached subjects every Saturday morning for the month of June the subjects were as follows: "Salvation," "Are You A Christian?" "Where and What Is Hell?" "Biblical and Christian Poetry."

The Rev. Mr. Rhynes began writing verse early in life. In 1915 he entered Shaw University for the ministry. Although he happened while he was a student at Shaw, that he won the honor of being selected class poet and on the campus he was often hailed by students as Dunbar's second.

His first poem to appear in print was in the Gastonia Gazette and the Charlotte News, 1922. Now, he writes poetry, epigrams, prose and lyrics, some of which have been arranged to music and published by the author.

His first letter from a president of the United States encouraging and appreciating his verse came from the late Theodore Roosevelt. Since that time he has sent some of his poems to the White House to his favorite president and to Buckingham Palace to King George. He has also included Governors of his home state and many educators of the southland. One of his lyric poems was an exhibit at the Jamestown Exposition 1906. And for years he has contributed many of his writings to some of America's leading anthologies including the New York World's Fair and the Golden Gate Exposition. Anthologies. He is included in Who's Who in American Poetry and in Who's Who in North Carolina.

His latest contribution of verse will be published this fall in the Southern Poet Anthology. The poet has membership in several outstanding literary and poetry societies in the north and his latest invitation to
