Vocal quartets, trios, choral and other singing groups, unattached or affiliated with churches, schools, religious and fraternal organizations are invited to participate in the 1948-49 National Music Festival, to be held in New York's Madison Square Garden.

The gigantic project will be conducted by the newly-founded National Music Festival Society, with funds provided by Mae Gale, nationally famed manager of Ella Fitzgerald, the Ink Spots and other famous stars.

Commencing early in the fall, a series of preliminary elimination concerts will be held in churches, schools, religious, educational, fraternal organizations, civic, cultural and welfare groups.

Following completion of local preliminaries, sectional finals will be held in capitals or largest cities of each state, with winning groups competing for selection to appear in the festival semi-finals.

Quartets, trios, and other choral groups desiring to compete for the prize awards or ministers, churches, religious, fraternal and similar organizations wishing to sponsor festival concerts in their city may communicate with the National Music Festival Society.

Writer Charges Ex-Ga., Solicitor Was Klan Member, Not Opponent

Author "Southern Exposure" ATLANTA (ANP) — JOHN A. Boykin, for 28 years solicitor of Fulton county, has passed on "from the Invisibile Empire to the Empire Invisibile," as the Ku-Kluxers put it.

I would be content to let the dead be dead, were it not for the fact that the accursed conditions in a lead editorial entitled "A Fearful Prosecution" was wrongfully credited Boykin with a "Ku-Kluxer investigation."

The Klan investigation referred to took place in East Point, Ga. back in 1939, and had to do with some 30 Klan members who were caught in the death of a white man. The real prosecution was conducted by assistant solicitor under Boykin.

As for Boykin's role, all I know is that Grand Dragon Sam Green, at a supper secret dinner meeting of the KKK Klavaller Klub, whipped and beat at Wingo's rate in Atlanta June 5, 1940, said that during those investigations, the solicitor had asked him why the golly Kluxers hadn't kept their damned mouths shut. Boykin was solicitor then.

"MY BROTHER KLANSMEN" This is not surprising in view of a certified copy of a letter in my possession, which Boykin while solicitor sent to William Joseph Shannon while he was imperial wizard of the Klan.

In his letter to the wizard on the solicitor's official stationery, Boykin said: "The work you are doing is a noble one. It was more vital that the Ku Klux succeed in their purpose, than the Confederate cause which involved only our political rights." Though it is
