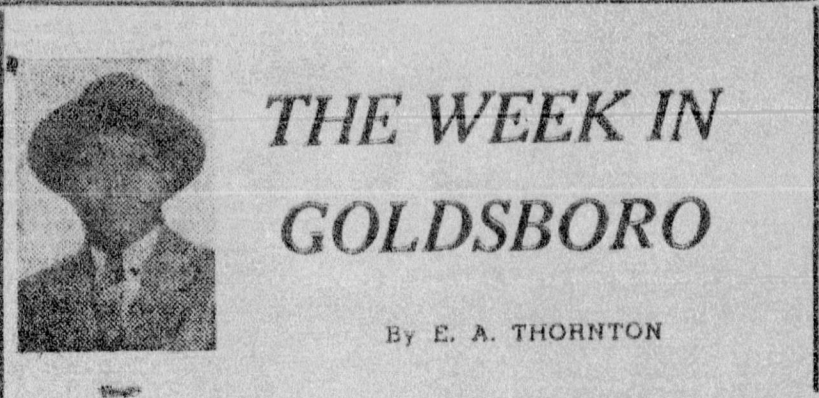

**PRaise STATEMENT BY COL. LANGSTON**  
It is heartening news when men like Colonel John D. Langston come out frankly and boldly as he did in his letter in "Opinion of Our Readers" published Tuesday in the News Argus. It is a sign that we, of both races in the South are already solving our own problems together and right here in the South. Colonel Langston goes right to the root of the matter in a fair and succinct manner that solution of the eternal race problem is to be found in giving the Negro opportunities to perform the duties of citizenship, that contact has nothing to do with the idea of "social equality" — it is equal opportunity to live and work together in the solution of our mutual problems. These are not Colonel Langston's exact words, but the implication is plain, we cannot work out our common problems by denying either group equal opportunity to work them out and working together sharing the responsibilities as abilities and expediency dictate. If more members of the white race in the South would dare to speak out and act without fears and suspicions of "Social Equality" dogboos, it wouldn't be long before the race problem would vanish in the country. **NEWS ARGUS "OPINION OF OUR READERS" WORTHY OF CONSIDERATION**  
I note that a request has been made that a Negro be appointed on the school board and that a Negro policeman be provided for the colored sections. I believe these requests are worthy of serious consideration. If we really want to develop the Negro race, there is no better way to do it than to place some proper and substantial responsibility upon it. Many people are greatly confused about this so-called question of social equality. Civil responsibility has nothing whatever to do with that question. Those who have responsibility placed upon them, usually respond. It is man's inherent nature to rise to responsibilities. One thing that has retarded Negro growth has been his continuing dependence upon the white to do something for him. His thinking needs to go in reverse. For example, I rebuke a Negro who had been working for me many long years because he took it for granted that I was expected to give him presents, Christmas presents, New Year's presents and presents for all occasions. I said to him "Do you ever stop to think that you have never given me a Christmas present — even a Christmas card? I saw that he needed to begin thinking about doing something for someone else — giving me something that will get him credit in a weakling's thing. That's one objection I had to the New Deal emergency program — that is the continuance of it after the emergency passed. Think of the white race also need to get a proper perspective on the racial question, and get rid of the absurd notion that contact with people means social equality. Neither law or contact makes for that kind of equality. Man selects his associations. He selects his social environments. That's his personal affair. There are thousands even among the white race, that I neither hope nor desire to have social relationship with. Not that I don't like them, I have simply chosen my social atmosphere. Aside from that personal right and choice, I believe in the kind of equality Aycock had in mind when he referred to the "Equality of Opportunity" the right to develop. A denial of that kind of right is discrimination under the laws of God and man. I believe if we recognized more clearly the distinction between the things we fear, and the things we need not fear, there would be less danger from the things we fear. It may well be that the mistaken desire of some of the minority race for social equality grows out of feeling that that is the only thing that will get him the rights he craves. So why not try the experiment of placing upon some worthy Negroes responsibilities in the civic field that will both test their powers to grow and determine whether that is their real aim. John D. 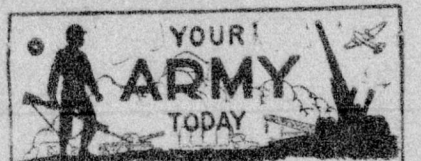
**NEGRO SCOUTERS DIVISIONAL COMMITTEE MEMBERS MEET**  
At the Divisional Committee meeting held at Dillard High School August 11, 1943 a large group of interested citizens from Wayne, Duplin, Sampson, and Johnston Counties were present. At which time R. L. Wolff, Scout executive of Tuscarora Council, introduced and presented to the committee Amos P. Cox, its first Negro Scout executive, who was given a happy and warm welcome by the committee. Mr. Cox is a graduate of Elizabeth City State Teachers College, Elizabeth City, N. C. and received his M. A. degree from Atlanta University, Atlanta, Ga. and has recently completed a nine weeks training at the National Boy Scouts Training School for Professional Scouters in New Jersey. Mr. Cox then presented a year round scouting program for the Negro Scout and Scouters and Tuscarora Council which was received and approved by the Divisional Committee. After a short discussion by the group present, it was suggested, because of inability to hold camp this season because of the polio situation and restriction, that during the month of September, we would do weekend camping at Camp Carver with troops from each county or by districts.

R. L. Wolff, Scout executive then presented the operating budget for Camp Carver for 1945 for which the citizens of the four counties, Wayne, Johnston, Duplin, and Sampson, would have to raise \$2800.00. After a short discussion by Dr. R. O. Weathers, divisional committee chairman, M. R. Zachary, camping activities chairman, and others, it was voted and placed on records, that the divisional committee of Tuscarora Council Boy Scouts of America will become responsible and raise \$2800.00. It was also decided that the drive to raise this money would begin on September 15th, and run through October 15th. H. P. Lucas, divisional finance chairman, is chairman of the drive with E. R. Williams serving as assistant. Scouters present were: J. O. Melvin, B. F. Clay, T. S. Johnson, H. V. Brown, M. H. Aldridge, William King, Leroy Clark, E. A. Thornton, M. R. Zachary, E. R. Williams, Rev. G. W. Todd, Rev. G. W. Todd, Rev. B. R. Richardson, Dr. R. O. Weathers, W. H. Rheinhardt, H. P. Lucas, Zachary, Holland, Pikeville, J. C. Thompson, C. H. Chalmers, Faison, N. C. B. G. Rich, Rufus Allen, H. L. Middleton, D. J. Standford, W. E. Smith, Warsaw, N. C. John Gray, Fremont, N. C. B. F. Greenfield, Mt. Olive, R. L. Wolff and Mr. Amos P. Cox, Scout Executives. The Boy Scout drive will not be held in connection with the Community Chest drive. Both drives will be held separately.

## MOVE FOR ITALIAN CONTROL OF FORMER COLONIES RAPPED

ANP—Last week deputies of the Big Four foreign ministers began meeting in London to decide the fate of 3,000,000 Africans living in the former Italian colonies. The Big Four are under instructions to render a decision before Sept. 15 or the issue will be thrown into the General Assembly of the United Nations.

The will of the African people is clear. A United Nations investigating commission recent found them virtually unanimous in their opposition to renewed Italian rule, even under the name of "trusteeship." One group of East Africans, the Somalis, have openly threatened to fight if Italy returns to rule them. The New York Times reported rumors last week that Ethiopia was prepared to offer military aid to Africans on her borders resisting Italian penetration.

Africans living in England have repeatedly told press correspondents that they feel betrayed at the very suggestion that Africans will be turned back to Italy after the suffering under Italian rulers both before and after fascism. Africans want a trusteeship under the United Nations, but they don't want Italy as the trustee.

**Big Power Maneuvers**  
In the preliminary phases of the jockeying for position, France and Russia have declared in favor of Italy as trustee for her former colonies. Britain and America claim to be undecided. Since Britain is now the administering power in these ex-Italian areas she can afford to keep a quiet, possession being nine-tenths of the law. Russia, preferring a weak Italy on her near eastern flanks, rather than the British navy, is for the present backing the Italians in order to get the British out.

Most Africans want neither Britain nor Italy as a trustee. The Somalis have requested that the Big Four, as a group, serve as trustee.

### UPWARD TREND IS SEEN IN ENGLISH RACE PREJUDICE

BIRMINGHAM Eng. (ANP) — West Africans are experiencing more and more racial prejudice every day as racists are openly revealing their thoughts here.

One "raity cinema" has according to reports, even placed out in the open a big sign which reads, "No Colored Persons Admitted."

This movie house is not alone in its discrimination, however. Some movies exhibit bad pictures of colored people sentinade. A certain picture called "People of Now-a-Day" scandalously represents the Negro on the screen.

Other reported anti-Negro pictures are "Sun Down" and "Men of Two Cities."

In other discrimination instances lodging houses are refusing colored boarders, many places refuse to employ them, and some people even laugh at them on the street.

Meanwhile, the Herbert L. Bruce group of "Truman for President" fund raisers announced from headquarters uptown that each of the Negro leaders in Harlem had contributed \$100 to that campaign, which also seeks to raise a million dollars to help re-elect the President.

### QUESTION SETUP IN DEMO OFFICE

New York (ANP) Setting up of a separate Negro division in Democratic headquarters is being questioned as opposed to the national committee's statement that there would be no such separation.

Rep. William Dawson took over the headquarters Monday as assistant to Sen. Howard D. McGrath of Rhode Island, national Democratic committee chairman.

Mr. Dawson said he planned to open two branch offices, one in Chicago and one on the Pacific coast. The latter will be in one of the three California cities, Oakland, San Francisco or Los Angeles.

Asked if the continuance of the Negro group was not in conflict with the announcement last week by Mr. McGrath that the Negro division would be abolished and the Negro workers apportioned to other units, Mr. Dawson said: "Four years ago I was assistant to the national committee and we had this same kind of organization. It was not publicly known as the Negro division then, but it was carried on the budget of the national committee as the Negro division. This year it will not be known as the Negro division, even in the budget, for we will raise our own funds and expect to have a residue to give to the national committee for its other work."
