Negro Marine Officer Assigned

\$10,000 MISSING FROM FUNDS FOR WARREN COUNTY SCHOOLS

WARRENTON — The turbulent conditions which have marked the Negro schools of Warren County for a number of years exploded into the open again last week as State Department of Education and SEI officials disclosed evidences of the misuse of approximately \$10,000 which had been allocated for payment of Negro teacher salaries.

Involved in the alleged misuse of the funds was J. Edward Allen, county superintendent of schools for the past 29 years.

According to the information released by the Department of Education the probe has been quietly underway for several months.

As a result of the probe evidence has been uncovered that the funds involved had been designated and allotted by the state for the payment of salaries of Negro teachers in the county.

The checks for these salaries, however, were endorsed for a second time by Superintendent Allen.

FARM WORKERS LOCKED IN TRUCK FOR 60-HOUR TRIP

DETROIT (ANP) — The importation of four truckloads of Negro laborers from Georgia here at \$35 a head was reported here last week.

Fresh from the welfare rolls of Georgia, 212 Negroes including 23 single women told that they would get jobs paying them \$6 to \$12 a day.

Angry about the whole affair, James Moore, director of Michigan employment service, ordered the trucker, Clyde Thompson of Savannah, to take the workers back in Michigan only a week, Thompson has been able to round up only 41 men for the return trip. He can find none of the single women. He said most of the men found things in Michigan much better than in Georgia.

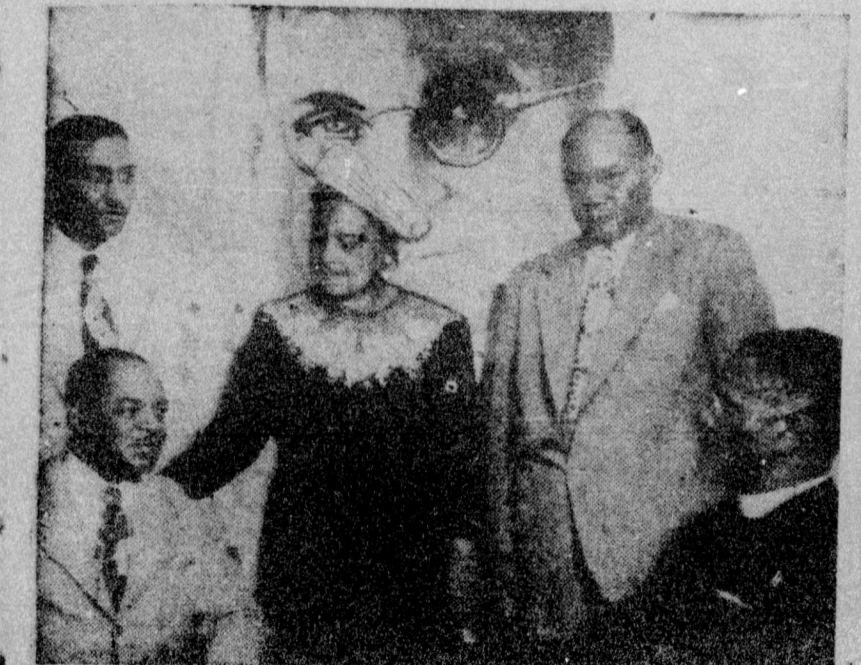
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INTERRACIAL GANG HELD IN THEFTS OF QUARTER MILLION

Philadelphia (ANP) — An all-out move by local police on an interracial gang of alleged burglars brought the total of its members from 10 three weeks ago to 22 this week and the original thefts from \$100,000 to a quarter million dollars.

USMC ASSIGNS NEGRO OFFICER TO QUANTICO, VA.

The first Negro officer to be commissioned in the Regular Marine Corps Second Lieutenant John Earl Rudder, USMC, of 1130 Clay street, Paducah, Kentucky, is now undergoing training in the Pre-Basic Marine Corps School at Quantico, Va.

Second Lieutenant Rudder, who is 23 years old, entered the Marine Corps upon graduation from Purdue University where he was enrolled in the Naval Reserve Officers Training program.

While serving as an enlisted man in the Marine Corps during World War II, he qualified in 1944 for the reserve officer training program, and was transferred from his duty station at Majuro Atoll in the Marshall Islands for enrollment at Purdue University. He graduated from Purdue and accepted his commission in the Marine Corps on May 28, 1948, to rank as a Second Lieutenant from June 4, 1948.

Second Lieutenant Rudder enlisted in the Marine Corps on July 23, 1943. Ordered to Camp LeJeune, North Carolina, he entered the radio operators school and, upon completion of his course, became an instructor at the Montford Point, North Carolina. (Continued on back page)

COUNTY TO GET HALF MILLION DOLLAR SCHOOL

NOTTOWAY, Va. (ANP) — Nottoway county will build a \$500,000 high school for Negroes here, it was announced this week by Ray F. Reid, county superintendent of schools.

The new school will be constructed to relieve crowded conditions in the present high school, Reid said. To be completed in about 15 months, it will contain 18 classrooms to accommodate 600 students. It will also have a cafeteria, visual aid, art rooms, shops and an auditorium.

The old school which had eight classrooms for 200 students will become a consolidated elementary school which will replace several one-room structures according to Reid. It has a shop and lunch room, but its nutrition has been converted into classrooms, Reid said.

No court action forced the building of the new school, he added. It came after a survey by the state department of education at the request of the county school board.

WALLACE SOUTHERN TOUR SCHEDULED TO START THIS SUNDAY

In his first campaign tour since the Progressive Party nominated him for president, Henry Wallace will swing through seven Southern states for a week beginning August 29.

As in his Southern tour last year, Wallace will dety what he terms the "criminal practice of Jim Crow" and will speak only to mixed audiences of both Negro and white citizens.

The trip will add hundreds of miles to what is already one of the largest and most strenuous presidential campaigns in American political history. Starting his campaign on December 29 last year — six months before the party conventions — Wallace has already crossed the country, delivering 82 addresses in 52 cities of 36 states, in addition to making a dozen

HAMPTON, Va. — College-trained persons should use their intellectual training and power not so much to become masters of men as to become servants of the unfortunate, the Rev. W. E. Carrington, pastor of the St. Catherine A. M. E. Zion Church, of New Rochelle, New York, told a summer graduating class of 112 persons in Oden Hall at Hampton Institute Friday morning, August 20.

"You represent the privileged group among our race," the speaker at the Eighth Annual Summer Convocation declared. "You represent knowledge, power, and privilege but all professions contain people who let all sorts of evils grow up around them without seeming to care."

The ones who do care, asserted Dr. Carrington, are those who consider themselves, like John the Baptist, "sent by God," and are therefore, "concerned about the physical, mental, and moral development of those they serve."

"The responsibility I place on you today," he told the graduates, "is to make out of your own commitments, the kind of world you want to have."
