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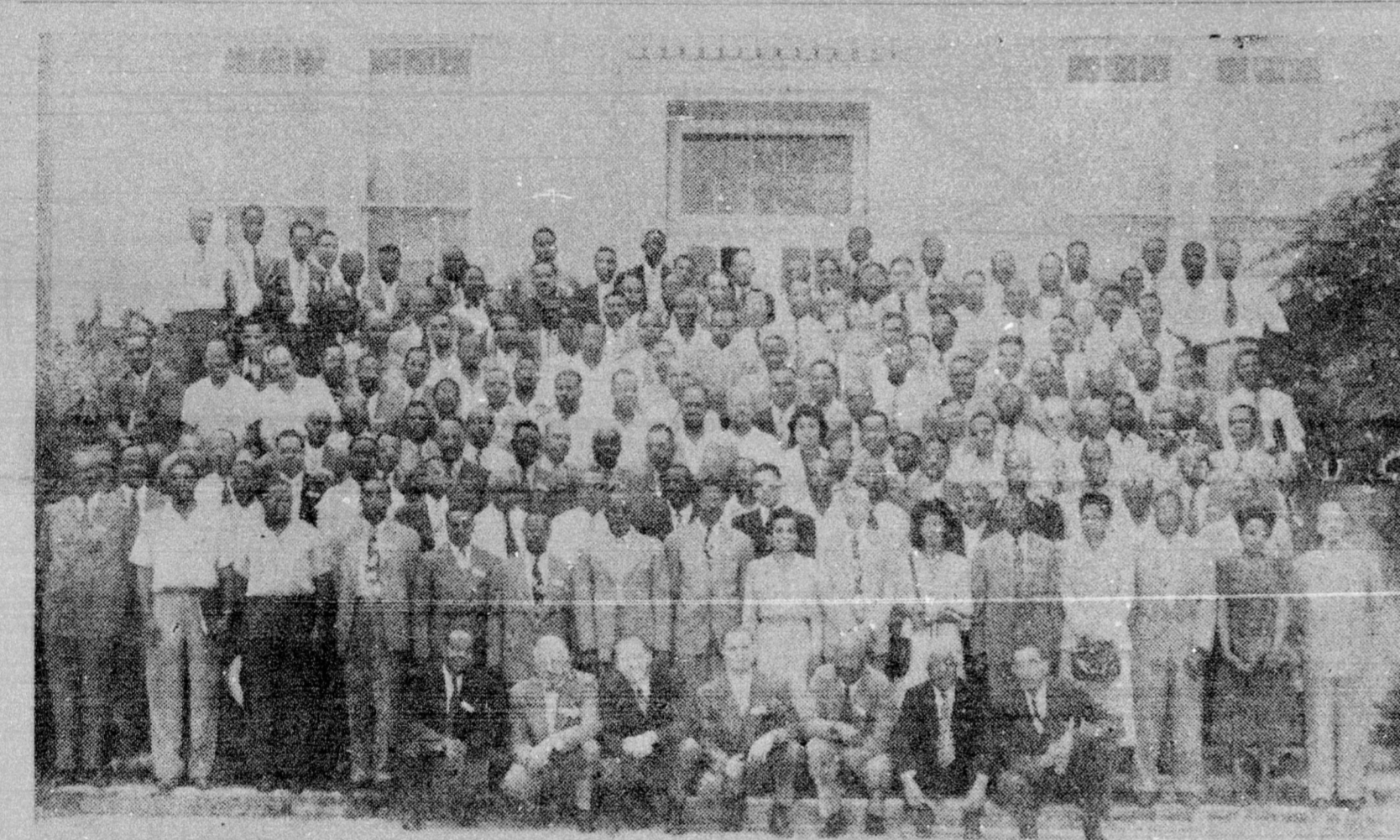

E. B. DuBois, challenged the right of NAACP Head Walter White to go to Europe on a Presidential Mission.
