The following books recently have been added to the shelves of the Kinston Public Library.

1. "Tomorrow is Forever" by Betty Smith, the author of "A Tree Grows in Brooklyn." This is a story of Brooklyn's underprivileged. The young Mary Shannon of the Williamson section represents thousands of youngsters aiming at happy marriage and a home of their own. Through all disappointments they live in the constant hope that "tomorrow will be better."
2. "How to stop worrying and start living" by Dale Carnegie. The author of How to Win Friends and Influence people is back with more advice this time dedicated to those who worry unnecessarily.
3. "The Heart of the Matter" by Graham Greene: A novel revealing the anguished delinquent into which love for a woman places an honest, middle aged British Colonial police official. A very profound and moving story of personal and religious conflict.
