## J. C. Evans Backs Army's Policies, Reports Gains

WASHINGTON (ANP) — James C. Evans, West Virginia educator now serving as civilian aide to the secretary of the army for Negro affairs, backs the army's policy of racial segregation in a report titled "The Negro in the Army—Policy and Practice," made to Secy. Kenneth Royall, recently. Evans gave restrained praise for progress made by the army in handling racial problems.

"The department of the army," said Evans, "may well claim that it has given more attention in quantity and duration, to the subject of effective coordination of human effort as regards race than any other agency of the government."

He pointed out that several publications were issued by the army to troops since the end of the war, which have been used in seminars, committees, and other training programs. One is a lecture given by Captains on "Of One Blood." Another is an "Army Talk" pamphlet titled "Prejudice."

**SUMMARY NEEDED**

In his report, Evans said the summary was called for in view of the President's recent executive order setting up a committee "on quality of treatment and opportunity in the armed services."

He said current army policies are credited that off-duty recreational facilities are to be carried on without segregation and that violations and efforts to evade his policy at army installations anywhere in the world meet with prompt corrective action when

All kinds of contests will be featured at the fair with greater emphasis on the agriculture, livestock and poultry show. Prizemoney will double the 1947 money.

The first day of the fair will be Rural Organization day with the attendance contest as highlight. People of the rural areas in Arkansas, Mississippi and Tennessee will vie for prizes. First prize will be \$50 to the person selling the most tickets over \$100.00.

Other contests will be the baby show, the Tri-State New Farmers of America contest, the Tri-State 4-H club department contest and the boy scout contest. Other prizes will be awarded for exhibits in the grammar, junior and senior high schools and college departments.
