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MOVE TO OUST US FROM JAMAICAN AIR BASES FAILS

KINGSTON, Jamaica (AP) — The long-mooted motion seeking to oust United States Air Force authorities out of Jamaica was moved last Thursday by a city Social member of the Knights and St. Andrew Corporation project. But the resolution met violent opposition from conservative right-wingers who were thrown out by a thin majority.

Wils O. Isaacs, former leader of the opposition People's National party, spearheaded the motion. And he got the full backing of his colleagues. He said that he wanted the council to request central government to tell the colonial office in London to revise the terms of the agreement under which America biased bases here covering a period of 99 years. This agreement was clinched with the U. S. by Britain during the heat of battle when Britain's back was against the wall. She had accepted, among other things, an old U. S. war ship for these privileges in U. S.

Isaacs said there was too much color discrimination doctrine upheld by U. S. He feared that the people of the island and the other Caribbean units would not stand for it here since they were demanding greater political autonomy with definite steps toward federation. These U. S. bases were a sort of "colonies within colonies" and were bound to interfere with the free rights of a people advancing rapidly to nationhood.

At this juncture a member of the conservative Jamaica Labor party said that it was well to have the U. S. bases here as sometime or other their assistance would probably be needed to "trample the living head of communism in the parts."



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
