Tobias Lists Ten Reasons Why We Should Support President Harry Truman

DR. CHARLES TOBIAS, represented by four relatives, is the director of the President's Committee on Civil Liberties. He is the author of the "Ten Reasons Why We Should Support President Harry Truman," a booklet which is being distributed in the White House. Dr. Tobias, who was arrested in 1947 for his part in the Rosenberg case, is a member of the National Lawyers Guild and the American Civil Liberties Union.

Dr. Tobias stated that the booklet is a result of a study of the rights of American citizens, which he completed in 1946. The aftermath of the report came when the President asked congress to pass legislation making it possible to put into effect the principal recommendation of the report. "In so doing he provoked the most violent storm of abuse and condemnation ever visited upon a President of the United States. Although this attack came from reactionary elements of his own party, there has been no support for his program from the opposition party which has the controlling hand in congress."

He also said that Truman held his ground "against pressures and threats unparalleled in the political history of our country," and cited him for the executive orders banning discrimination in the armed forces and civilian government services.

The Count's one-night tour will be broken on October 22 when he takes to the stage of the Paradise Theater in Detroit for a week's engagement in his annual appearance at that Motor City house.
