JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. (AP) — Wire service direct from the United Press is coming in to the Lincoln University school of journalism this year for the first time since the school was opened in 1942. The teletyped copy will be used by professional journalism students, particularly in the news editing class. The machine has been installed in the news editing laboratory of the journalism building. The school will get reports daily 6 a. m. to 5 p. m.

Cafe Ordered To Pay For Refusing Service

DULUTH, Minn. (AP) — After deliberating for four hours a jury here awarded \$500 to a Negro woman against a cafe which refused to serve her because of her race. Mrs. Joseph Waters of Duluth had sued the Forest Inn, about 10 miles from Duluth on the North shore drive, for \$500 for refusing to serve her and her party March 28. District Judge William J. Archer announced the decision in the St. Louis County District Court.
