The tide turned in the fourth when John Hunter, freshman blocked and recovered Howard's punt on the Morgan 25. Cletis Horton plowed 3 times and Galbreath once, Horton plunged into pay dirt from the 2. LINEBERGER won the game with his kick. Eagles 14-Bears 7.

Many old timers remember that vaunted squad of 1930-34. Dooms, Palmer, Holmes, Riddick, Malone, Dixon, and others, who though rated as underdogs were fired and charged to such frenzy they ran up a score of 12-0 in the first half on that Morgan dream team of that year: Conrad, Troupe etc. only to lose in the second frame to razzle-dazzle and power because there were no substitutes. King Football reigned supreme over the North Carolina scene last week-end as thousands of million fans converged on Durham Saturday afternoon to see Coach Riddick's North Carolina Eagles humble the powerful Morgan State College Bears by a one-point margin and then returned to Raleigh Saturday night to see a fighting St. Augustine eleven bow to the Shaw University Bears by a official 12-0 score.

Other state collegiate games found A. and T. on the short end of a 21-0 score against Hampton, and Johnson C. Smith swamped under a 34-0 count in its game with Va. State. The Fayetteville Teachers

NEW YORK (ANP) — "Unsegregated meetings have been held on numerous occasions in the south, long before the south ever heard of Henry Wallace," Oliver W. Hill, Negro councilman of Richmond, said in a press release last week here in New York.

According to Hill there are 1,200,000 Negro voters in the south, with the majority of them voting for the Democratic party in November. Hill was in New York for a few days, speaking from a Democratic sound truck, entreating Harlem to vote for the Democratic party this fall and to register DEMOCRAT.

A letter from Drew Pearson, Washington Merry Go Round author, and who has been making certain charges against Col. Julian here in Harlem, was received this week by the writer.

Dated September 26, the latter, part of a correspondence on the charges against the colonel, says: "There is absolutely no question that Julian was flown around Europe at the expense of our government."

## COVENANT RULED ILLEGAL BY DISTRICT COURT

**OKLAHOMA CITY** — (ANP) — A real-estate agreement, banning Negroes from white sections of the city was ruled "invalid" by a federal district court judge here last week, on the grounds that the U. S. Supreme court had recently ruled that covenant pacts are "unconstitutional."

The ruling was handed down by District Judge Lewis Morris of Oklahoma county, in a suit brought by white residents seeking to set aside the property deeds of two Negro families in a block. The plaintiffs based their suit on an agreement signed by residents in the area that no owner would sell to a Negro.

"The supreme courts has ruled that such a covenant is unconstitutional."

It is expected that the case will be appealed to the state supreme court.

## U. L. REPORTS NEGRO SHIFT TOWARD MORE SKILLED JOB FIELDS

**NEW YORK** (ANP) — Since 1940 there has been a substantial shift of Negroes from menial and non-skilled jobs to sales, clerical and semi-skilled occupations, according to a report made here last week by the Urban League of Greater New York. The survey, conducted by the bureau of the census for the league.

According to Edwin S. Lewis, executive secretary, the gain in occupational pattern coincided with a 30 percent jump in New York's Negro population over a seven year period, from 532,950 to 699,450. The latter figure, an estimation represents the population for the New York division of the New York-northeastern New Jersey metropolitan district.

As of 1947 about 64 out of every 100 Negro men were in service occupations. By 1947, the figure had risen to 36 for women and 23 for men, the report said.

## CHURCHES MUST TAKE LEAD IN AVERTING WAR

**LOS ANGELES** — (ANP) — Recent interviews with ministers and churchmen of all denominations and nationalities throughout the city have disclosed that their convictions are the same about the swiftly transpiring events throughout the world today. The heads of members of churches with congregations of a few hundred up to the thousands have come to the conclusion that "only the church can save the world from certain destruction."

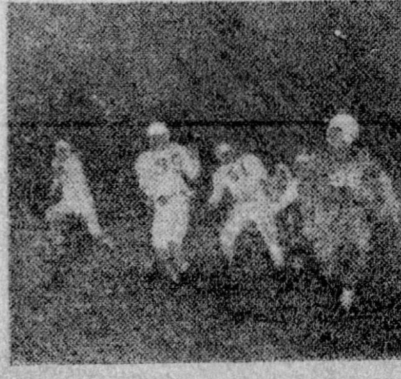
Fearful of the outbreak of the third and greatest world war, church leaders here last week gave vent to the feeling that the church must act quickly to avert the coming of another war. Away from the Negro districts, the same feeling prevailed in white churches, the discourse of the ministers was heavily laden with suspense and solemnity, and rabbis were especially worried over the threatening conflict.

At an interdenominational meeting in First Baptist Church here early last week, the Los Angeles delegates to the recent assembly of the World Council of churches, held in Amsterdam, reported on the outlook discussed by those attending.

Dr. Willie Martin, president of the local federation, which sponsored the meeting jointly with the Wilshire Ministerial association said:

"Because the Amsterdam conference is one of the significant historic conferences of Christendom, this gathering should command the interest and attendance of all Christian people of Los Angeles."

"As Christian people, we face a sobering situation. The whole church must achieve new understanding and spiritual power. We need the message of Amsterdam. The World Council begins in the hearts of our people."
