Shaw Bears Leads At Half; Bisons Stage Comeback

WASHINGTON — Howard University came from behind in the fourth period to defeat the Shaw Bears from Raleigh, N. C., 14-6 here last Saturday before a crowd of 12,000 in Brooks Stadium.

The Tar Heel eleven went ahead with a first-period touchdown on a four yard pass from Jim Jackson to Bellamy, and then thwarted each Howard threat until the final quarter.

Virg Anderson, Howard halfback, took a Shaw punt on his 24-yard line and raced 75 yards for the touchdown which yielded the Bears even early in the fourth period. When Thompson converted, Howard led 7-6.

Thompson intercepted a pass by Jackson and carried it to the Shaw 10-yard line in the waning minutes of the game to set up Howard's second touchdown. Green moved the ball to the three-yard line in two carries, and Davis went over on a quarterback sneak. Thompson again converted.

The Shaw Bears will travel to Richmond, Va., this week where they meet the Virginia Union Panthers in a tight contest, Saturday at 8.

VIRGINIA UNION U. CLAIMS LARRY DOBY

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)— One of the landmarks of the capital city of the Old Dominion, Virginia University, has claimed Larry Doby, Cleveland Indians, outfield star, as the school's very own.

At this historic old Baptist College which has the "granddaddy of Negro coaches" still active Coach Henry Hedges, and much as old tradition, a certain room in the freshman house on the campus has a sign "Larry Doby slept here."

It seems that Doby skipped Long Island University after the Christmas holidays in 1941 after a tryout for Clair Bee's basketball stars. Five weeks before the spring semester started he had "unofficially" with a freshman ace of Virginia's 42 "Jumpin' five five" cage squad.

In February, one of the first students to register was the same Larry Doby who became a member of the school's greatest basketball team in its history. In the team's most game against its traditional enemies, Virginia State, Doby scored 15 points.

By May, however, Uncle Sam had called, and Doby was sent to Great Lakes Training center where he played on the base team. Here he played along with Marion Motley, famous Cleveland Brown fullback.

These days, Doby's students and ex-students alike are shouting "Larry Doby slept here."

The game opened with the Smith Bulls kicking to the Rambling Rams and after a few punt exchanges the game settled down as a nip and tuck fray until early in the second quarter when "Jumping Joe" Roach, bolted off his own left tackle, reversed his field, and raced 40 yards into padding. The half ended with the J. C. Smith Bulls, paced by Kirk Evans' snail, letting 26 yard run, kneeling at the door of the Ram road line, but to no avail.

Smith opened the second half with a devastating land and air attack which had marched 40 yards into opposition territory when Lester "Tiger" Gaither intercepted a Washington aerial to halt the drive. The Bulls were not to be denied, however, as once again they started a march featuring the brilliant passing of Kirk Evans and McDowell. This drive was halted on the Winston-Salem 7 yard line when "Whisperman" Washington was stopped cold on a fourth down running play.

After an exchange of punts the "T. C." eleven started a drive on their 40 yard line, which was led by the slashing drives of "Powerhouse" Davis, and the lightning like thrusts of "Jumping Joe" Roach and "Ship" Dalton. This drive was culminated when Dalton crashed over left tackle from the one yard line. Davis' plunge for the conversion was to no avail.

Outstanding play for Smith was turned in by Washington, Evans, and McDowell in the backfield and by Long on the line.

For the Rams, Roach and Davis were particularly outstanding in the backfield and Lester Gaither was the sparkplug of a rugged line which played great football from the opening whistle to the end.

Hampton's early second period bid for a TD, with Christian Lovett and Peyton totting the leather, culminated in a Lincoln tally. Big Jim Cooke reached up and snagged Lewis' pass on the Lincoln 6 as the Pirates were trying desperately to score. The nobby Smith bucked for 3 yards before sending an aerial to "Junior" Davis that covered 62 yards. Davis, Wertz, Harris and Smith, Lincoln's sensational backfield gridgers, carried to the Hampton 7 on 4 tries. And after an off-side penalty took it to the 2. Jolting Joe Harris plunged through a tackle for the marker.

Big guns for Hampton throughout the day were Christian Peyton, Dillard, and Lovett who tore through Lincoln's fortresses for 20 first downs. However, the Lincoln wall, with stocks Frank McCray, Oscar Slavink, and Prentice leading the way held firm at the crucial moments and hit the Pirate runners for numerous losses.

Lincoln gained 482 yards rushing and the Pirates picked up 110. Lincoln averaged 62 yards on one pass out of four attempts and Hampton gained 42 yards by converting 6 out of 10 aerials. The Pirates outdistanced the Lions in first downs gained with a total of 15 to Lincoln's 4. Bobby Smith, Lincoln ace, averaged 37 yards on 11 punts. And Hampton's booters averaged 46 yards on 3. Lincoln intercepted four Hampton passes.

Early in this period Wilson scored after a sustained drive of 65 yards. The scoring play was an end run by Robinson, of Wilson which was good for 38 yards and the score. The extra point was good placing Wilson in the lead by the score of 7 to 0.

During the half-time the 60 piece Darden High School Band furnished music and the usual ceremony crowning of Miss Homecoming was carried out impressively.

The second half began with the Wilson team still showing more power and at times making the Pirates appear as a hopeless eleven. In this period, Roger Benton, Adkin punter was injured and removed from the field.

After a time-out period the Pirates launched a ground attack which left the Wilson aggregation stunned.

Walter Carr, flashy fullback, returned a punt for forty yards to place the ball on Wilson's 21-yard line. Coward on the next play picked up a first down. The next play found Carr taking the ball off tackle for the score. Carr's kick for the point was good and the game was even 7 to 7.

The Pirates in the last three minutes started a sustained drive with Carr leading the attack and scored with only time left for one play. Coward took the ball over from the three yard line after Carr had picked up three first downs. Again Carr's kick split the uprights. The game was over and Adkin Pirates had again gloriously represented "Dear Ole Adkin High" by winning by the score of 14 to 7.

The Pirates return to Adkin Park to play Snow Hill on Friday night.

JOE LOUIS TO FIGHT BIVENS IN 6-ROUNDER IN CLEVELAND, OHIO

CLEVELAND (AP)— Heavyweight Champion Joe Louis, in his first bout since his announced decision not to retire from the fight game, will have Jimmy Bivens, local heavyweight, contending for the title in a six-round affair at the Arena November 17. It was announced here last week.

The headlines the first pro boxing show staged here in six months and is one of those contractual deals which permits no official decision.

This means that the only way Bivens can win the heavy crown would be via a knockout, technical or real.

The contract for the fight is all in favor of Louis. He is to receive 25 per cent of the gate, plus return privileges. He has the right to select the site of the return bout and at the same time Bivens is prohibited from fighting anyone else if he should win. A return match would give Louis 40 per cent of the gate and Bivens only 20 per cent, despite the fact that Bivens could be the new titleholder.

For his November 17 show, Bivens will get \$4,000 guarantee with a privilege of 12 1/2 per cent of gate receipts. The contract drawn by Robert Selzer, assistant law director, was signed by Harry Mendel, ad to Marshall Miles, manager of Louis, in the presence of members of the Cleveland Boxing commission.

Louis is scheduled to arrive in Cleveland for a training window on November 13. He has three other exhibitions before teaching here.

According to Mendel, "We have to protect the title against a decision in a six-round bout. However, if Bivens should give Louis a good fight there is every reason to believe Jimmy could meet the championship over the 15-round route next summer. Louis is looking for a worthy opponent."

FIGHTING HORSES WIN BY 61 TO 8

St. Augustine's fighting horses trounced Livingstone College 61 to 8 in Charles Park last Saturday afternoon before a happy Homecoming Day crowd. The winning eleven scored early in the opening period when Roland Miles passed 40 yards to Statham. Ernest Hicks scored St. Augustine's second touchdown on a quarterback sneak.

An end run by Van Henderson from the seven gave the Saints six more points and Statham scored again on a reverse from the 19. Livingstone made its first points when Jones was trapped in the end zone for a safety. At the half, St. Augustine led 27-2.

The first touchdown in the second half resulted when Miles passed to Statham, who lateraled to Hines. Miles and Burch added two more touchdowns each before the slaughter ended.

ROOKIE HONORED BY CHICAGO TEAM

CHICAGO (AP)— James Pendleton, formerly shortstop for the Asheville, N. C. Blues and now with the Chicago American Giants, won the title of "Rookie of the Year" on the Giants team by a large majority vote, according to an announcement made here last week by R. S. Simmons, business manager. Two other newcomers, Bervencido Rodriguez and Robert Vargas, placed second and third respectively in the voting.

The three players joined the club when it was in training in the early spring at the Martin stadium, Memphis, the only Negro owned and lighted park in the country.

Pendleton had an excellent record of hitting and fielding with the Asheville team which improved approximately 50 percent after he had been with the Giants 30 days. According to critics, he has been the strongest throwing arm of any player in the league and it is predicted he will be top man in the 1949 season. He is rated on par with Gene Baker, Dave Eppert, Ia. of the Kansas City Monarchs, whom T. Y. Baird believes is the best in the league.

Rodriguez, a pitcher, and Vargas, catcher, not only played their first year in Negro professional baseball, but also made their first trip to the United States last season. They were brought here by Quincy Troupe, who was the Giants' 1938 manager, and were among the stars of the Puerto Rican champion team of the 1947 winter meet on the island. Two other Puerto Ricans opened their season with the Giants, Rafael Ortiz, pitcher and Alfonso Gerard, outfielder. Both returned to the island before the season closed. Ortiz was reported to have been the best pitcher on Puerto Rico team in 1947.

Still concentrating on an effective offensive attack, the coaches were happy this week over reports that Chester "Crazy Legs" Ryan, Tiger scotch, who has been sidelined with an ailed muscle since the affair with Southern, may get the doctor's go ahead signal and should be in "game form" for the fight with the Dragons.

The Dragons will come to Houston sporting a 43-0 victory over Butler College on September 18, and lamenting a 25-6 affair dropped on September 25 and a 25-13 tilt on the Prairie View Panthers taken by the Steers of Texas College on October 2.
