PIKEVILLE TRAINING SCHOOL Prof. J. H. Carney, announces that the first issue of the Pikeville Training School paper, "The Campus Echo" has just been printed and mailed out to the parents and friends. This is the first time in the history of the school that a paper of this kind has been printed.

The Pikeville Training school was completed and its operation began October 2, 1942, at which time the faculty consisted of only eight members, four elementary teachers and four high school teachers. Since that time the faculty has grown to a total of around fifteen teachers. Under the leadership of Prof. J. H. Carney the school became an accredited high school in the spring of 1946, and is one of the few county schools with a veteran's school to offer technical and specialized training to the Ex-servicemen of World War II. Great progress has been made in all departments of the school, and especially in the home economics and science departments. Other departments making progress are the library and the campus store which was built and painted by the veteran's trade class.
