ness Nov. 9, 1948. It was signed by Percy Sawyer. On receiving notice of his discharge Jordan made the following statement:

"I am today in receipt of a letter from the secretary of the treasury notifying me of my discharge as collector of internal revenue because of my refusal to carry out executive order No. 9880 which would abolish segregation throughout our collector's offices in Alabama.

"Segregation of the races is a basic part of our way of life. The pleasant relationship between the colored and white races is the result of this fundamental principle.

"Segregation is not only desired by the vast majority of our people, but it is required by local laws. In spite of these facts, it is apparent from interpretation of fair employment practices as provided by the President's order, that color or race is the dominant consideration in the selection of government employees.

"Over an indefinite period of years, and to the present date, all of our women employees have been members of the white race. This has been due to the outgrowth of custom and tradition, and further necessitated by the physical facilities in the buildings occupied by the collector's local offices and branch offices in Alabama.

"I would like to direct your attention to the situation that would develop in our offices in the event of the employment of both colored and white employees.

"At present, due to inadequate space, there is only one room available for the stenographic pool. Further, there is only one ladies' rest room available for these stenographers. This would create an intolerable situation, and one that cannot be promoted or accomplished.

"Because of these same traditions and customs, it would not only be impracticable, but without doubt would lead to discord,

and even violence, if colored deputy collectors were assigned to make investigations of the books and records of white taxpayers.

"This unfortunate condition would be contrary to the desires of both races, who, at the present time, are working in harmony.

"There is no section of this country that is attempting to do more than to work out a solution under which both races can improve their status. The colored and white people of this district are solving their own individual problems and it left alone, they will do it harmoniously and to their mutual advantage.

"I cannot in good conscience, administer any rule or regulation which will destroy our peaceful race relations. From the foregoing, it should be quite evident that my convictions are not in sympathy with the directive herein disseminated.

"Therefore, I must say that it will be impossible for me to subscribe to or fulfill the instructions set forth in executive order 9880."

"In this critical time, when so much depends upon the economic stability and strength of America," Mr. Isley concluded, "there is no more practical way for Americans to help make America strong than through the practice and promotion of individual thrift."

AGGIES DOWN VA. STATE, 14 TO 0

GREENSBORO — The rampaging Aggies of North Carolina A. and T. College registered their second consecutive upset victory Saturday by turning back a bewildered Virginia State combination from Petersburg, 14 to 0, in their annual CIAA contest here.

The Aggies, whose powerful defense smothered the Trojan attack and limited the powerful Virginia to two first downs, started preparations early this week for the Thanksgiving classic with a Johnson C. Smith University Bulls of Charlotte, this contest being scheduled as a twilight game at the Greensboro field.

Not only did the Aggie defense overpower the Trojan offense, but Coach Bill Bell uncorked the greatest offensive attack of the year as his Aggies rolled up 279 yards from scrimmage and completed two of eight attempted passes for 28 additional yards. This powerful offensive threat, combined with the 45-yard average punting of Miles Kelly, triple-threat back from Media, Pa., set the stage for the
